Applying an integral systems lens, students are presented with the multitude of diversity in populations, cultures, environments and beliefs to be considered in adventure programming. Students will explore personal development and context relative to serving others. Students will examine strategies for adventure program adaptation and design. Socio-cultural and ecologically informed approaches to adventure education will ensure quality and safety for specific populations.

COURSE SCHEDULE, TOPICS, AND ASSOCIATED PREPARATION / ACTIVITY / EVALUATION

WEEK or DATE RANGE	ACTIVITY or TOPIC	
WEEKS 1-6	In this course we will be looking at the nuances of the way that outdoor adventure education is practised. We will consider how adventure education might be ignoring or have blind spots with regards to issues such as gender, destructive consumerism, colonialism, curricular conservatism, etc. From this we will develop our ideas about how we might wish to evolve our practice as outdoor adventure educators. We will begin by looking at current issues and ourselves, and think about where we have come from and what might influence our outlook on adventure education.	
WEEKS 7-10	In weeks 7-10 we will look at a variety of ways of thinking about and doing adventure education by examining how it is done in different places around the world. You will work in pairs to research an organization/region/country and then share your findings with the whole group.	
WEEKS 11-14	In weeks 11-14 you will focus in on one or two particular issues that have been highlighted during the investigation phase and explore those topics further with particular attention to how you might use that knowledge in your own context as adventure educator
