CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

The course introduces the four major sub-fields of anthropology: archaeology, physical and cultural anthropology, and linguistics. It surveys human evolution, archaeological evidence for cultural reconstruction, societies at different levels of socio-cultural complexity, and language in cultural context.

MCQ quizzes are homework based open book multiple choice quizzes covering content covered in the preceding topic. Quizzes from weeks 1-5 are due prior to Exam 1, Quizzes from weeks 8-14 are due prior to Exam 2. In class activities consist of hands-on applied learning opportunities run during class time. Some require homework preparation. Article annotations consist of online collective annotations and response to annotations of an assignment article. The Anthropology in MY life assignment consists of identifying linkages between relevant anthropological content and individual lives in photo journal posts and in class discussion. Exams consist of written answers to posed questions and are completed in class under exam conditions.

I am always willing to address specific questions and issues you face but will not reteach entire classes. Extensions and late submissions: Most evaluative elements in this course are open for extended periods of time and extensions will only be granted in extreme extenuating circumstances. Extensions may not be granted however late submissions are accepted. Late submissions will receive a deduction of 5% a day and will not receive any feedback. Evaluative elements more than 1 week late will not be accepted.

Make ups or Re dos: Students will not be permitted to submit additional material for make-up evaluations or to re-do evaluative elements to ensure fairness to all students taking the course.
