CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

The course introduces the four major sub-fields of anthropology: archaeology, physical and cultural anthropology, and linguistics. It surveys human evolution, archaeological evidence for cultural reconstruction, societies at different levels of socio-cultural complexity, and language in cultural context.

- Address ethnocentrism as a barrier to understanding other cultures.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

Late Penalty

All assignments must be completed and submitted on the date assigned. All late written work will be penalized **5 percent** per day late, unless an extension is legitimately warranted and approved by the instructor well in advance of the assignment due date. Assignments will not be accepted beyond one week of their due date. Please note that time-sensitive material such as presentations will not be accepted, and exams will not be rescheduled without prior consultation with the instructor.

Written Assignments

All assignments must be typewritten, double-spaced, pages numbered and properly cited and referenced using APA referencing format. Undocumented paper (papers without in-text citations) will not be accepted.

Class Attendance

While some of the course content is available on D2L, **this is not an on-line class**; attendance is not mandatory but expected. I do not record my lectures and there is no textbook. This means that if student success in the course is dependent on regular attendance.

Mark/Grade Challenges and Appeals

A student wishing to question a mark assigned by the instructor on any course evaluation component must clearly articulate in writing the specific element of the assignment being questioned as well as a reason supporting a change in the mark. AI and Academic Integrity

Artificial intelligence presents new challenges for our understanding of academic integrity. Currently, Camosun does not have a policy governing AI-use. How it may or may not be used in courses is up to the discretion of the instructor. We will make time in class to discuss the pros and cons of using AI as a tool but my position, for now, is that students may use AI tools such as Grammarly to assist them with writing mechanics but are prohibited from using AI tools such as Chat-GPT to create content for assignments or exams. Misrepresentation and plagiarism are serious forms of academic misconduct, which is difficult to avoid when using many AI tools. CAL Accommodations

Please make sure you have referred to the course syllabus before sending me questions about exams, due dates, etc..

Note Taking and Study Habits

Students should plan on a weekly **minimum of 3 hours** outside of scheduled class time for the completion of readings and for general studying. Additional time is required for studying for exams. I would suggest a minimum of 8 hours of studying for the midterm exams, and this is if you have taken detailed notes in class and on the course readings. Expect it to take much longer if you do not read the webpage content weekly.

An outline of the lecture presentations will be uploaded to the course website. These should be used as an outline, **not as your sole source of information**. You will need to write down additional information given during lecture. Students are expected to read the webpage content and articles independently and incorporate the additional information into their lecture notes.
