It is very important that you attend each lab as this is the only way to learn the material that you will be responsible for in the lab quizzes. Students earn 1% for each lab (there are 9 labs with participation marks, and 3 indicated with * in the above schedule that do not have an associated mark). Whenever possible labs are related to lecture content from the week to provide a hands on or more in-depth opportunity to think about both method and theory. Please note that only excused absences discussed ahead of time will have the associated participation mark added to the weight of the lab quiz. There will be a lab quiz on Thursday, April 11, worth 11% of your final grade that will evaluate lab content from the semester, with a focus on skills-based material that is not tested in	20%
EXPERIMENTAL ARCHAEOLOGY TERM PROJECT Proposal DUE by Sunday, February 18 at 11:59pm Project report DUE by Sunday, April 9 at 11:59pm Experimental archaeology is an example of Middle Range Theory. With guidance, students will design an experiment, collect data, and evaluate a hypothesis tied to interpretations related to past human behaviours that may not be clearly represented in the material record. Multiple examples will be provided in the first lab class on January 11, and lab time on February 1 is dedicated to workshopping individual research designs ahead of submitting the proposal (worth 5%) by February 18.	25%
Exams MIDTERM EXAM (worth 25%): Tuesday, February 27. FINAL EXAM (worth 30%): during the college's final exam period in April (please check the exam schedule posted on MyCamosun in late February.) These two exams could include multiple choice questions, matching, open-ended short answer questions and long answer questions. COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

Exams:

Exam will consist of some multiple choice and several sections of short answer and longer answer questions based on readings, D2L resources, and content covered in class. The exam will be written in a computer lab and must be written in person and during the scheduled times unless the instructor has agreed to an alternative date in advance. This includes the lab quiz. Unavailability of the text or pressure of other work will not be accepted as excuses for missing exams or other assigned work.

Assignments:

Please make sure that assignments are submitted properly via D2L instead of emailed to me. Things get misplaced very easily in my inbox, and it is harder for me to provide feedback and tie grades into the gradebook if files are not submitted through D2L. Please submit as a Word document of PDF, other formats often will not open for me.

It is important that assignments be submitted on time. **Five percent** of the total mark will be deducted for every day an assignment is late (yes, even weekends); while this may not seem like many marks, remember that 5% is the difference of a letter grade, and this adds up quickly. This can be avoided by not procrastinating

and staying organized in terms of time management. I do not want to have to decide whose excuses are more justified than others, so unless it is an extreme circumstance, no exceptions will be made. For clarity, having to take an extra shift at work, or getting a cold the day before something is due that you have had many weeks to work on it are not considered extreme circumstances!

Al and Academic Integrity:

Artificial intelligence presents new challenges for our understanding of academic integrity. Currently, Camosun does not have a policy governing Al-use. How it may or may not be used in courses is up to the discretion of the instructor. We can discuss the pros and cons of using Al as a tool but my position, for now, is that students may use Al tools such as Grammarly to assist them with writing mechanics but are prohibited from using Al tools such as Chat-GPT to create content for assignments. Whoever does the work does the learning; you are here to learn, and I am here to help you with that. Providing feedback for an Al generated assignment is a waste of my time, and not useful for your continued personal and academic development. Please remember why you are here (it's about more than just a grade), and let me know how I can help!

Misrepresentation and plagiarism are serious forms of academic misconduct, which is difficult to avoid when using many AI tools. All infractions have to be reported to the dean of the school, with consequences for students. Please review Camosun's Academic Integrity Policy if you are unfamiliar with the rules about plagiarism and/or academic misconduct. Please be familiar with the APA citation style for the term project; there are great resources on the library's website to help with citing any imaginable resource being considered.
