DESCRIPTION	WEIGHTING
LABS Weekly labs are opportunities to apply concepts discussed in lectures. It is very important that you attend each lab as this is the only way to learn the material that you will be responsible for in the lab quizzes. Students earn 10% of the overall mark for completing activities in this lab time; sometimes labs are experiential where student participation earns a mark, but some labs have exercises to be handed in for marks and feedback. There will be two lab quizzes throughout the semester, each worth 5% of your final grade. QUIZ 1: Friday, March 4 QUIZ 2: Friday, April 15	20%
EXPERIMENTAL ARCHAEOLOGY TERM PROJECT	
Experimental archaeology is an example of Middle Range Theory in that it creates a bridge between the fairly static material record and the dynamic behaviours that archaeologists are most interested in identifying in past cultural systems. For this assignment, students will build an experiment to address more humanistic elements of the past. This may include replicating a belonging using only materials and tools that would have been available to the original tool makers/users to ask questions like: How long does it take? What other tools are required, and what evidence of these manufacturing marks are left on the finished tools? It may include using a tool to assess use wear or replicating a technology like boiling water with hot rocks. The experiment must control for as many variables as possible to produce useful results. Each student will submit a formal lab write- up detailing the experiment (ie. hypothesis, background information, methodology, results, discussion) and, if applicable, the replicated belonging, technique, or technology. Students will learn how to structure this report-style write up in class. We will brainstorm and talk about designing experiments during lab time on February 11, and a research hypothesis and detailed project outline (worth 5%) is due by February 27 so that I can provide feedback before students execute the experiment.	25%

Things get misplaced very easily in my inbox, and it is harder for me to provide feedback and tie grades into the gradebook if files are not submitted through D2L. Please submit as a Word document of PDF, other formats often will not open for me.

It is important that assignments be submitted on time. **Five percent** of the total mark will be deducted for every day an assignment is late (yes, even weekends); while this may not seem like many marks, remember that 5% is the difference of a letter grade, and this adds up quickly. This is an unfortunate way to lose marks, and can be avoided by not procrastinating and staying organized in terms of time management. No exceptions will be made unless there are extreme circumstances that are discussed with me BEFORE the due date.
