Upon successful completion of this course, a student will be able to:

- Discuss the evidence and theories for the origin and evolution of the human species.
- Identify and explain the forces of evolution as applied to human evolution.
- Explain and analyze the relationship between human biology and culture.
- Explain why humans belong to the primate order.
- Explain human biological diversity from the perspective of adaptation.
- Critically evaluate, from an anthropological perspective, such issues as: the AIDS pandemic, the origin of "diseases of civilization", "race", evidence for human origins and evolution.
- Perform basic human body measurements.
- Identify basic differences between human and non-human skeletons.
- Establish a basic biological profile from skeletal remains: age and sex.
- Solve simple problems in practical genetics: inheritance and pedigree analysis.
- Recognize the normal human karyotype (chromosome characteristics).
- Explain why the human species cannot be divided into biological races and that the concept of race is a cultural construct.
- Apply physical anthropology in addressing problems of the modern world: racism, human health and disease, species extinction.

<u>Quizzes</u>

The Quizzes will consist of ten questions (multiple choice), which will be conducted at the beginning of the synchronous sessions (Wednesdays). These quizzes will cover the material you will have read for the current week, as well as the video(s) posted on D2L.

In Class Applied Activities

In class applied activities are lab-based activities that use knowledge learned from the asynchronous session. These will be hands on and require in person participation.

Bioethics Research Project

The bioethics research project requires students to select a question or concern about bioethical practices in biological anthropology. Students will research the topic and submit their research notes. A collaborative decision will be made about the best way to present the outcomes of their research as the final submission.

<u>Exams</u>

There are 2 timed exams in this course. One during the semester and the other during the final exam period (asynchronous). The exams will be written on the computer and will examine your understanding of course content. The exams are **non-cumulative**. You may bring one page (double sided) of notes to each exam.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

Course Commitment: I have an expectation that you have enrolled in this course with the goal of participating and completing the work required. You need to be able to commit to working on this course in a regular weekly fashion, completing the asynchronous materials, attending the synchronous sessions and planning your schedule with appropriate time for out of class work. You have been given all the deadlines, are given sufficient time to complete the work and have the ability to plan your work flow. I recommend planning to complete your work well before any deadlines so that you can respond to what life throws at you. I am unlikely to grant extensions for situations such as being asked to pick up a shift at work, coming down with a minor illness on the day material is due, having exams or material due in other courses. When possible late submissions may be accepted with late penalties of 5% per day however this is unlikely in this course as the way the content builds on previous work often prevents moveable deadlines.

Communication: For me to support you and teach you in this course we need to communicate effectively. You should plan to check your email/D2L/messages a minimum of twice a week to ensure you get timely information from me. I will respond to emails when possible, but I am unlikely to respond on weekends or after hours. I have the expectation that you will reach out for assistance, stay in communication and be responsible for your own conduct in this course.

External Assistance: All submitted work must to completed by you and you alone. Unless specified in the instructions you are to produce the work yourself, to not share information about evaluations with other students, and to not collaborate on assignments

and exams. When submitting work in this course you are asserting that the work has been generated and written by you (excepting appropriately cited material and quotations). Submitting work that has been completed by someone other than you, or has been generated using software or AI tools, even if you edit, revise and rephrase, is cheating and violates the Academic Integrity Policy. To be clear, in this course you may use word processing tools to update spelling and grammar in your assignments, but you may not use tools or others to generate, draft or significantly edit your work. I want to hear what you have to say about the topics assigned, I want to hear your arguments, your opinions and your voice- AI tools, while they may write flawlessly (and boringly) do not demonstrate your understanding and do not allow you to learn.

Consequences: Work that I determine to have been generated or excessively edited by someone else or assistive technologies (software or AI tools) will be given a grade of 0 with no opportunity to redo the work.
