Students will focus on creating and evaluating two-dimensional works such as drawings, paintings, and collage. The process of artmaking will enable them to use their imagination, their intuition, and their individual creative strengths. Students will test, evaluate, and experiment with their use of media and ideas.

- 1. Produce work that constitutes an awareness of the issues, history, and concerns of drawing, painting and other two-dimensional art forms.
- 2. Acquire skills in a wide range of techniques and materials, including inks, paints, charcoal and graphite.
- 3. Choose appropriate materials and methods to implement their own concepts.
- 4. Explain how experimentation is essential to creativity.
- 5. Develop individual creative interests and conceptual skills.
- 6. Critically evaluate their own and others' projects.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

Assignments will account for most of your course grade. Student course work will be assessed on each assignments ability to demonstrate; informed experimentation, process comprehension, and exploration of the concepts introduced within 2-D studio practice. Students should speak with the instructor if there is any uncertainty or concern regarding assignment guidelines, results, or course standing.

This studio-based course requires students to work on aspects of their assignments in class to develop shared learning, creative community, and experimentation. Students are responsible for safe, respectful, and clean use of the studio and materials. Studio etiquette requires students to clean up after themselves each day before leaving the studio and be respectful of others who use the space. Work and materials must be stored in designated storage areas (or with special permission of instructor and instructional technician) or removed from the studio. Students are reminded that storage is limited in capacity and security.

Extensions on assignments may be granted by consultations with the instructor prior to the due date. Late assignments (without prior arrangement and documentation) will be deducted 1% per calendar day. Late submissions (without prior notification and arrangement) will NOT be accepted seven days after the due date. All late submissions must be handed in directly to the instructor unless alternate arrangements have been made.

Due to the experiential nature of the course, regular attendance is required. Students must inform the instructor as soon as possible about known absences. More than four unexcused absences will result in a student not passing the course. Documented absences and those given prior permission due to the unavoidable nature of the absence will be excused. Prompt attendance is a professional responsibility and a requirement of the course. Should a student be absent for more than 20 minutes of a class, they will be marked as absent for the day.
