CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Through a variety of projects, students will explore paint, pigment, colour and other related media. Students will learn about formal and informal structures in painting with a variety of materials like canvas, wood and paper, and tools such as brushes, knives, sponges and airbrushes.

- 1. Use a variety of traditional and non-traditional materials and tools.
- 2. Analyze and apply colour theory.
- 3. Demonstrate a variety of painting skills: naturalistic and representational, photographic and abstract.
- 4. Explore content such as the narrative, the symbolic and the political.
- 5. To interpret and generate constructive and interculturally aware critiques of one's own and others' projects.
- 6. Describe historical and contemporary references.

REQUIRED MATERIALS & RECOMMENDED PREPARATION / INFORMATION

Supplies

This will depend on your budget and ambition. However, if you are serious about learning and being successful, having good materials must be your priority.

Regardless of your budget, this list will serve as a guide. Island Blue Print also has this list and can help you decide what works best for you. They have both discount and professional grade paints, mediums and surfaces.

Camosun College also has a woodshop. As the course progresses there will be additional instruction on building your own painting substrates, eg. cradled panels and canvasses.

Starter kit of Paints & Brushes

Cost

A full set would be ~\$350 for the best (artist quality) such as Golden, but you can get any that fits your budget. A caveat – cheaper paints have less coverage. You'll end up using more paint just to get the effect you need as you may need to re-paint an area. The money you save will cost you in time.

Medium

We recommend jars or tubes of acrylic paints, but you can also use gouaches (poster paints but better), Prismacolor sticks (chubbies not pencil) or oil pastels. You can also get smaller tubes. I do **not** recommend watercolour pencil crayons. Oil paints are **not** permitted in the studio classroom as we do not have the means to manage solvents. Oil sticks are acceptable if you do not use solvents with them.

Items required for the first class:

- 2 or 3 black or white, simple, still life objects
- sketchbook (any size)
- HB or 2B pencil
- eraser
- ruler (optional)
- Vine or Willow charcoal
- 3 small/medium surfaces approximately 12"x16" (eg. Masonite or hardboard panel, matboard, cardboard, canvas paper)
- acrylic gesso and a brush for gesso
- 1 big brush for priming surfaces (1 1/2" or larger)
- A selection of stiff synthetic brushes for acrylic.
- Acrylic paint: one small tube of ivory black, and one large tube of titanium white.

Additional items to be purchased. These will be discussed during first class and can be purchased afterwards... if supplies last.

- Tool box: shoebox, plastic storage, small travel case, etc. for storing and transporting required supplies
- Apron, lab coat, or work-shirt
- Acrylic paint: In addition to black and white: quinacridone red or alizarin crimson (or similar), cad red light, viridian or a dark green, ultramarine blue, burnt umber, raw sienna, yellow ochre.
- optional: cad yellow, phthalo green, dioxazine purple, pyrolle orange or cadmium orange (substitutions are acceptable)
- matte medium (acrylic)
- two or more small or medium sized surfaces each week: stretched, primed canvas, canvas paper, gessoed wood panel, gessoed mat board or cardboard
- rags
- painters tape or masking tape
- palette knife

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

Assignments will account for most of your course grade. Student course work will be assessed on each assignments' ability to demonstrate informed experimentation, process comprehension, and exploration of the concepts introduced within 2D studio practice. *Students should plan to meet with the instructor if there is any uncertainty or concern regarding assignment guidelines, results, or course standing.

This studio-based course requires students to work on aspects of their assignments in class to develop shared learning, creative community, and experimentation. Students are responsible for safe, respectful, and clean use of the studio and materials. Studio etiquette requires students to clean up after themselves (or their group) each day before leaving the studio. Works left in common spaces 30 minutes prior to the next class start time, or 9am the next day will result in an immediate deduction of 3% per work (i.e., a painting left out to dry overnight not in designated storage spaces in Y117). Work may only be stored in designated storage areas (or with special permission of instructor and instructional technician). Students are reminded that storage is limited in capacity and security.

SCHOOL OR DEPARTMENTAL INFORMATION

- 1. Students are required to confirm that each of their instructors has received a memo from CAL.
- 2. All CAL students are required to know and understand the details of their accommodations and to be aware of CAL frameworks.
- 3. In order to receive an extension on an assignment, each student must initiate a conversation with their instructor at least 5-week days before the deadline to negotiate and establish a new deadline. Students are reminded that all extensions for course work are limited to semester end date (last of day of class).
- 4. Student absence. If students need to leave a class or lab or are unable to come to class or lab because of illness, it falls upon the student to contact the instructor about their absence. Students are required to take the necessary steps to get caught up in a timely manner on missed material including demos. Students may confer with classmates to learn missed material. Please know that instructors and technologists do not conduct one on one instruction with any student who has missed class/lab. However, instructors and technologist are available to answer specific questions.
