SUMMATIVE DEADLINES are formal assessments at the end of a learning period (midterm & end of term) which involve students handing in their work for assessment and they are assigned a grade and given feedback on areas of strength and potential growth. Please note that work can be altered up until the formative deadline for <u>Projects.</u>

2. FINAL PORTFOLIO

DUE: Friday, December 8th (4:00 pm) → ASSESSMENT WEIGHT: 40%

Portfolios consist of student studio work submitted/presented in an online format through free website platform WEEBLY.com. Online portfolios consist of photographs of all research, exercises, inprocess work and complete works for four studio projects that will be completed during the course. Portfolios are assessed twice during the term: Project 1 & 2 for the Midterm Portfolio Assessment and Project 3 & 4 for the Final Portfolio Assessment. 2. ACTIVE PARTICIPATION (20%)

Participation is assessed on a sliding scale based on quality of work and contributions. For example: 1/5 = 20%, 2/5 = 40%, 3/5 = 60%, 3.5/5 = 70%, 4/5 = 80%, 4.5/5 = 90%, etc.

ATTENDANCE

Due to the experiential nature of the course, regular attendance is required. As a professional courtesy, students must **independently** inform the instructor by email <u>prior to class</u> about known absences and must plan ahead and submit work <u>prior to the deadline</u> for planned absences. More than three <u>unexcused*</u> absences may result in a student not passing the course. <u>Informed absences and those given prior permission due to the unavoidable nature of the absence</u> will be <u>excused</u>. Three late arrivals or early departures to/from class will be considered the equivalent of one absence.

Missing key demonstrations will result in a student needing to schedule alternate times in consultation with the Instructor and Course Technician's based on the classroom schedule and Technician's availability prior to being permitted to begin related projects and assignments. Demonstrations require significant preparation and planning and missing them will result in students' processes being delayed. Prompt attendance is a professional responsibility and a requirement of the course.

EXTENSION / LATE POLICY

Extensions on assignments may be granted by consultations with the instructor <u>prior</u> to the due date. Please email your instructor directly in advance of the deadline to request an extension. Extensions will only be granted prior to assignment deadlines and must be requested through <u>student-initiated</u> consultation/negotiation with their instructor (this includes all forms of accommodation). Late assignments (without arrangements made prior to the deadline) will not receive participation marks for that assignment and for graded assignments will be deducted 2% per <u>calendar day</u>. These submissions will NOT be accepted seven days after the due date.
