CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

An introduction to traditional and contemporary three-dimensional practice, this course is concerned with the concepts and methodologies surrounding three-dimensional art making in our time. Students experiment with a variety of modes of production, and develop some of the fundamental techniques used in sculpture. In addition to these investigations, assignments relative to the history and social impact of these practices are reinforced through readings and group discussion.

- 5. To interpret and generate constructive interculturally aware critiques of one's own and others' projects.

SCHOOL OR DEPARTMENTAL INFORMATION
