CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Students will investigate the malleable qualities of clay by designing and making both sculptural and functional clay objects. Within a contemporary visual art context, students will explore the natural elements of clay by learning hand-building techniques such as coil building, slab construction, pinch, and throwing on the potter's wheel. Students will also learn the safe use of tools and equipment and gain an understanding of clay as a material through the processes of making clay, creating glazes, and traditional pit firing.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES / OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Describe their work as it relates to pre-industrial and modern ceramics. Display competency and skill through completed works using various hand-building techniques: coil building, slab building, effective clay joinery, and basic proficiency on the potter's wheel.
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge of ceramic surface development by using a range of finishing techniques, including, but not limited to, glazing and traditional development of the burnished surface in combination with pit firing, sgraffito, underglazes, and decals.
- 3. Use safe practices for loading, unloading, and firing conventional electric as well as traditional kilns

All the basic pottery tools required for the professional as well as the beginner *The "must have" tools for creating with clay! This kit contains one of each of these eight tools:

- *Loop tool (for carving, hollowing & trimming),
- *Ribbon tool (for edging, shaving & thinning),
- *Wood potter's rib (for contouring, flattening & scraping),
- *Needle tool (for drawing, piercing & slicing),
- *Wood modelling tool (for cleaning up, finishing & modelling),
- *Sponge (for moistening, absorbing & refining),
- *Metal scraper (for melding, scoring & smoothing),
- *Wire clay cutter (for cutting & removing pieces).
- *small bucket with lid.
- *Brushes: One-inch foam brush (disposable) and one to two for image making. Brushes used in watercolour and acrylic can be used to create imagery on ceramics.
- *Use a hand towel and appropriate clothing (coveralls) for work on the wheel and in the studio, and avoid using paper towels excessively. *a pair of DISHWASHING GLOVES, * these are not optional. Tools are to be always kept in the studio.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

Missing two or more classes without a valid reason (2% per day to a maximum of 5 days) will seriously jeopardize your successful completion of the course. Class discussions and demonstrations cannot be recreated and, therefore, not made up if missed. Collaboration and Attendance will also be evaluated on the level of care and the quality of your engagement with your work and participation in a safe, clean studio environment.

Class hours are 9:30 to 1:20, with a lab from 2:30 to 3:30. Readings will be assigned from text. Works completed from assignments and personal exploration will be presented for critiques scheduled throughout the term. Late assignments, including work not submitted due to missing a class, will be penalized 2% per day to a maximum of 5 days, after which a zero will be given (weekends will be counted as one day). Extensions will only be granted before assignment deadlines and must be requested and agreed upon through student-initiated consultation/negotiation with their instructor (this includes all forms of accommodation).

Non-course-related objects will not be possible during this course. Refer to the studio etiquette grade.

SCHOOL OR DEPARTMENTAL INFORMATION
