CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Students will be introduced to the fundamentals of performance art. Class exercises and readings will guide them through the exploration of using their own body as a generator for artwork. Students will learn how to create content using tools such as autobiographical material, dreams, rituals, text, and persona. They will be introduced to performances in various ways, including visual and sound elements. Students will develop proficiency with digital cameras, editing software, and sound and lighting equipment. Students will develop original material for performance art considering the use of time, space, and the performer's relationship with the audience.

1. Produce nuanced works influenced by the issues, history, and concerns of performance art.

instructions for executing movement, sets, lighting, sound, costume and text, and result in live performances. 3. Demonstrate the influences of subject matter and content on performance production.

4. Use a wide variety of subjects, for example, social and political environments, as a source of subject matter to produce artworks.

5. To evaluate and generate constructive and interculturally aware critiques of one's own and others' projects in the context of performance art.

6. Demonstrate proficiency with digital cameras, editing equipment, and basic sound and performance lighting equipment.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

ATTENDANCE

Due to the experiential nature of the course, regular attendance is required. As a professional courtesy, students must **independently** inform the instructor by email <u>prior to class</u> about known absences and must plan ahead and submit work <u>prior to the deadline</u> for planned absences. Attendance is one of the main criteria for the "presence and engagement" participation category. It is required because class discussion cannot be recreated and, therefore not made up if missed. More than three *unexcused** absences may result in a student not passing the course. <u>Informed absences and those given prior permission due to the unavoidable nature of the absence</u> will be *excused*. Please arrive early to class, as late arrivals often result in the disruption of whole class processes. Prompt attendance is a professional responsibility and a requirement of the course. Students should set aside the whole lecture and lab time each week and schedule other appointments outside of class time.

If a student needs to miss a class, they are required to take the necessary steps to get caught up in a timely manner. In this case, students may want to confer with classmates for missed material. Please know that instructors and technologists are not able to conduct one-on-one instruction with students. However, instructors and technologists are available to support with concerns, provide feedback and answer specific questions. Don't hesitate to reach out if you have questions.

EXTENSION / LATE POLICY

Extensions on assignments may be arranged by consultations with the instructor <u>prior</u> to the due date. Please email your instructor directly at least two full days in advance of the deadline to request an extension and negotiate a new deadline. Extensions will only be granted <u>prior</u> to assignment deadlines and must be requested through <u>student-initiated</u> consultation/negotiation with their instructor (this includes all forms of accommodation). Late assignments (without arrangements made prior to the deadline) will not receive participation marks for that assignment and for graded assignments will be deducted 2% per <u>calendar day</u>. These submissions will NOT be accepted seven days after the due date.
