- 5. Evaluate and generate constructive and interculturally aware critiques of one's own and others' projects.
- 6. Demonstrate thoughtfulness and confidence when consuming, creating and critiquing the work of others and their own.

This studio-based course requires students to work on aspects of their assignments in class to develop shared learning, creative community, and experimentation.
