CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Students will study theoretical and practical applications of advanced skills to evaluate and care for emergency conditions as they pertain to the scope of practice of a First Responder and an Athletic Therapist. Students will apply anatomical, physiological and biomechanical knowledge to the prevention and assessment of injuries and illnesses, as they relate to urgent care and patient transportation. Students will study theoretical and practical applications of advanced urgent care skills needed to evaluate acute and chronic injuries and conditions related to the thoracic, abdominal and pelvic regions, the musculoskeletal system, and the environment. Students will apply theoretical and practical skills in multifactorial situations, including various sporting environments, special populations, crisis intervention, poisonings and multiple casualty incidents.

*This course is restricted to students in the Bachelor of Athletic & Exercise Therapy program.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES / OBJECTIVES

At the completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Identify, assess and demonstrate advanced urgent care skills for common urgent and life-threatening
 injuries and conditions related to the facial, thoracic, abdominal and pelvic regions and
 musculoskeletal system based on current protocols.
- Demonstrate the scope of practice, legal and ethical requirements of an Athletic Therapist in emergencies.
- Explain the importance of the Athletic Therapist in emergencies.
- Demonstrate proper professional conduct when interfacing with the medical team and communicating with the patient.
- Apply strategies to prevent injuries and potential emergencies.
- Prepare emergency care equipment for an athletic team or event setting.
- Demonstrate the various roles of the emergency medical services team in caring for an injured individual.
- Demonstrate pharmacological principles and apply treatments in accordance with authorized drug profiles.
- Demonstrate proper equipment removal for the assessment and care of a patient effectively and efficiently.
- Apply theoretical and practical urgent care skills in multifactorial situations, including various sporting environments, special populations, crisis intervention, poisonings and multiple casualty incidents.

Class / Lab Participation & Expectations of Conduct

Students participate in role-playing activities to practice skills on each other. Learning what the human body feels like in a healthy condition is important for recognizing unhealthy or injured states. In the course of learning to do assessments and treatments, students will be palpating other students on a regular basis. Students must refrain from any inappropriate touching. Students with concerns are to speak to the instructor prior to the beginning of the course or as it arises during the semester. There can be no exception to this participation.

Students will maintain optimum levels of safe behavior (personal hygiene, decontamination of personal protective equipment, care with lifts and use of proper body mechanics, etc.) with a minimization of potential for disease transmission.

Students must come appropriately dressed to allow for hands on application / demonstration of emergency care techniques.

Low cut shirts, pants / shorts that expose underwear, and flip flop sandals are NOT acceptable dress for labs. Students should expect that any lab may be conducted outdoors, regardless of weather, to simulate real-life working conditions.

Students that do not come prepared to actively participate (appropriate dress, fanny pack, etc.) in labs may be asked to leave.

Attendance

Research shows a strong correlation with class attendance and academic success. Given the practical nature of this course, and the need to understand the theory utilized during the labs, attendance at lectures is strongly encouraged.

The Red Cross Professional Responder Certification requires attendance at all labs.

For any of the below, it is required that students contact the instructor.

An excused absence includes:

- c) Permission of instructor prior to absence.
- d) Compassionate reasons.
