An advanced physiology course that investigates physiological states and their relationships to injury and disease. Focus is on the body's response to injury/disease, tissue healing and repair, and how the healing process relates to therapy and rehabilitative medicine.

\square Explain physiological responses of various body systems that would indicate homeostatic imbalance.
☐ Explain the cellular changes and different body system responses to injury and disease across the ages and various populations.
☐ Identify the considerations for cultural, ethnic, gender, age and functional ability differences in clientele.
☐ Demonstrate timely and appropriate interventions and referrals.
\square Explain the internal physiology of the human body in normal function and disease states.

If a student is unable to write an exam through no fault of his, her, or their own, valid documentation must be provided and it must be discussed with the instructor well in advance of the exam date. If the student is absent for an exam and has not made arrangements with the instructor in advance, a zero grade will be applied.

Late Assignments

Assignments handed in after the due date will not be evaluated. Extensions will not be granted for D2L quizzes. Students who miss assignments for legitimate reasons, such as an illness may be allowed to hand the assignment in late. All other reasons are unexcused and will not be accommodated for.
