Students will apply assessment and rehabilitation theory and skills in a clinical setting. Students will apply therapeutic modalities and manual therapy skills in a clinical setting under the direct supervision of a certified preceptor. Students will apply clinical skills with an increased independence.

At the completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Demonstrate the role and responsibilities of the athletic/exercise therapist in prevention, immediate care, treatment and rehabilitation of injuries and diseases.
 - Develop an emergency action plan for the placement.
 - Apply the principles of rehabilitation design utilizing exercise prescription, therapeutic modalities and manual techniques.
 - Demonstrate effective prevention, assessment and treatment of common injuries and diseases.
 - Demonstrate effective taping and wrapping for common injuries and conditions prior to the client's participation in activity.
 - Demonstrate effective evaluation of the client's condition to determine their readiness for activity.
 - Demonstrate effective guidance regarding proper warm up and pre-activity readiness.
 - Demonstrate effective decision-making and communication when working with clients, coaches, medical team members, faculty and peers.
 - Demonstrate athletic/exercise manual therapy techniques with consideration for any cultural, ethnic, gender, age and functional ability differences.
 - Use a logbook to document placement activities.
