CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Advanced theoretical and practical skills to assess and rehabilitate the injured individual as it pertains to the spinal column. Focus is on the musculoskeletal and neurological assessment and rehabilitation of the spinal column. This course is restricted to student in the Athletic & Exercise Therapy program.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES / OBJECTIVES

At the completion of this course, students will be able to:

a) Design an appropriate orthopedic assessment routine for musculoskeletal injuries of the pelvis, lumbar spine, thoracic spine and cervical spine.

- b) Perform an appropriate orthopedic assessment routine for musculoskeletal injuries of the pelvis, lumbar spine, thoracic spine and cervical spine.
- c) Design the appropriate mobility, stability or functional rehabilitation through recognition of dysfunctions in the mechanics of movements of the vertebral column joints.
- d) Design an appropriate rehabilitation program to facilitate healing following the determination of the injured tissue's healing stage.
- e) Apply manual techniques, therapeutic modalities and exercises that promote recovery to an active lifestyle or return to sport across a variety of populations.
- f) Develop analytical and interpretive skills to facilitate a professional orthopedic assessment and rehabilitation program.
- g) Demonstrate effective communication in verbal and written forms through the development of advanced listening skills and effective note taking.

Quizzes:

Online quizzes will be given each week to assess your knowledge of the content covered in the Readings Assigned. Corresponding Module Packs/Reading Assignments can be found on D2L. Quizzes will be open for 1 week and will close Sunday at 11:59pm. You may only attempt each Quiz one time. There are a total of 5 quizzes, each worth 3%.

Case Studies:

Case study assignments will be given each week and will be based on the assigned readings. Class time will be provided to work on the case studies as a group and are designed to apply critical thinking to a scenario. Case studies will be presented to your peers to evoke discussion. There are a total of 5 case studies, each worth 2% for active participation in these assignments.

Article Critique Assignment:

Critique of two scholarly articles of your choosing related to the assessment or rehabilitation of the head, thorax, or spine. This written submission should include an outline of the key points of the article, and your views of the article including new concepts learned and implications of the research from a clinical perspective. More information can be found on D2L. (3-4 pages + title page and reference page, double spaced, size 12 Times New Roman font, 1' margins, APA formatting)

Final Written Examination:

Written test questions will cover class lectures and assigned readings. Test format will include multiple choice, true/false, matching, diagrams, short answer, and long answer.

Practical Examinations:

Practical exams consist of applying special tests, assessment, and rehabilitation of injuries to the spine. The midterm practical exam will be based on clinical assessment, while the final practical examination will be based on designing and implementing a rehabilitation plan.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

Exams & Assignments:

The course exams and assignments are pre-scheduled by the instructor and due as outlined in this course outline or as posted on D2L. The final exam will be scheduled by the Registrar's office.

Exams: Midterm and final examinations must be written on the date scheduled. Final examinations may be scheduled at any time during the examination period; therefore, students should avoid making prior travel, employment, or other commitments for this period. **All students are expected to write the final exam at the time, date, and location set by the Office of the Registrar.** If a student is unable to write an exam through no fault of his, her, or their own, valid documentation must be provided, and it must be discussed with the instructor well in advance of the exam date. If the student is absent for an exam or presentation and has not made arrangements with the instructor in advance, a zero grade will be applied.

Assignments: Papers and/or assignments that are handed in after the due date/time will receive an 10% per day deduction. After the 5th day the assignment will receive a grade of 0%. Papers and/or assignments that are deemed unacceptable by the faculty will be returned and receive an automatic 10% deduction on the grading of said item. Papers and/or assignments will receive a 10% per day deduction thereafter. After the 5th day the assignment will receive a grade of 0%. Failure to turn in an assignment may result in an incomplete final grade being assigned for the course. Reasons that a faculty may deem an item unacceptable include, but are not limited to the following: grammar, spelling, content, punctuation, and inappropriate referencing/citations.
