COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

Biology 252 is the first of two pathophysiology courses for students in the second year of the Bachelor of Science Nursing Program. The course initially focuses on foundational concepts of pathophysiology that define dysfunction of the major organ systems and then proceeds to examine specific diseases within the cardiovascular, endocrine and nervous systems of the human body. The objective is to enable students to apply theoretical knowledge to nursing practice. While the course will cover diagnosis and medical management of diseases studied, protocols related to nursing care and nursing management will be covered in nursing courses.

D2L Review Questions

Online review questions for the weekly material will require completion on D2L as detailed in the course outline schedule of assessments above. These brief D2L questions will assist in ensuring that you are staying up to date with the content being covered and collectively they will comprise 5% of your final grade. You may attempt these review questions twice during the period that they remain open (approx. 1 week, see outline above); your final mark will be an average of those two attempts. If you are satisfied with the mark you receive on the first attempt and do not make a second attempt, the first attempt will be your final mark for the quiz.

There will be a 2-hour time limit assigned to complete these review questions online, within the period that they are open. These reviews are designed to be completed within 30 minutes, so you will have plenty of time to complete them. Once the time-period has been completed, you will be informed which questions are incorrect, however, the correct answer will not be revealed – which will redirect you to look back through your resources to gain a better understanding of the concept. A separate schedule for these review questions will be posted to D2L reminding students of the deadline. *It is your responsibility to ensure that these D2L review questions are completed on time considering they remain open for multiple days as extensions will not be granted*.

Once the deadline has closed, students will no longer have the opportunity to gain marks for completing these questions. A copy version will be posted after the deadline closes to allow for additional practice and will not impact your original mark.

Exams

Exam information (types of questions, material covered, duration, regulations) will be posted on D2L approximately one week before each scheduled exam date. Exams will be a combination of multiple-choice questions, fill-in-the blank and short written answer questions. There will be a total of 5 in-person assessments to complete during the course of the semester including 2 quizzes, 2 midterms and 1 final exam. Note that the exam format will differ between these assessments.

IMPORTANT EXAM INFORMATION:

<u>All examinations must be written at the scheduled time</u>, unless there is a documented medical or other emergency that prevents you from doing so. In this case, you must notify the Instructor directly (not someone in Nursing) BEFORE the examination day and submit supporting information to corroborate your emergency. A note simply stating that you were unable to write an examination due to a non-emergency related situation will not suffice (personal, confidential information is not required). Minor ailments are not considered valid excuses. <u>Contacting your instructor after an assessment has already taken place will result in receiving a zero</u> <u>for that assessment</u>. In addition, please draw your attention specifically to Camosun's examination policy which states that examinations must be written at the scheduled time except in case of an emergency. Examinations will NOT be deferred for vacations or pre-booked flights or other non-emergency situations. Examinations cannot be written before the scheduled dates or times or by switching to other section times as these rooms are all at capacity for exam writing purposes.

In Summary: All exams must be taken at the scheduled time.

- \circ If an illness or emergency prevents you from attending the scheduled exam time
 - You must notify your instructor directly in advance of the examination time
 - You must provide appropriate documentation (as noted above)
- For <u>quizzes missed</u> due to an acceptable medical emergency:
 - The weight of the quiz will be transferred to the next midterm exam
 - Therefore, the midterm exam will be now worth 35% (12.5% + 22.5%) of your final grade
 - Furthermore, your midterm will have additional questions to reflect quiz material
- There will be a *single scheduled date and time for writing any deferred MIDTERM exams*
 - This will take place at 1pm on November 30th (week 13; see also Course Schedule above)
 - You will write a different version of the original exam
 - If you cannot make this deferral date and time due to another medical emergency:
 - This midterm exam material will be transferred to your final exam and the final exam will carry the increased weight of the missed exam (22.5% + 25% = 47.5%).
- If the <u>final exam is missed</u> due to an acceptable medical emergency there is also only one deferral date and time scheduled as per College policies.

- Please note these deferrals may be scheduled to take place in the evening or weekend.
- PLEASE NOTE: These assessments have been planned and spread out across the course, the term, and the material in order to provide you with the best chance for success in the course, as well as retention of the information. For this reason, please do your best to write all assessments as outlined here on the dates they are scheduled.

Examination questions will require return of factual information as well as interpretation, assimilation and application of information often based on clinical scenarios. You can practice working through clinical scenarios by referring to your textbooks and their accompanying student resources. Interpretation, assimilation and application of information are repeatedly undertaken in class discussions. Please expect that certain concepts and information found in your textbook that may not directly be discussed in lecture may also be found on your exams and quizzes.

Attend classes regularly and pay attention to class discussions. Repeated absences from class and reliance on notes obtained from peers will compromise success in the course. A variety of concepts will not be adequately understood by only viewing the PowerPoint notes packages provided on D2L and thus will require the understanding generated through classroom discussion and explanations in addition to supporting readings and video explanations when required. Integral to this course is the ability to demonstrate in exams the use of correct scientific/medical terminology with correct spelling. Knowledge of accepted medical abbreviations is also required. For the latter, some exam questions will use medical abbreviations and your answers will have to be written without the use of abbreviations. A penalty will be applied for incorrect spelling and use of abbreviations in answers to exam questions.

A final minimum overall course mark of 60% is required to proceed with the next level of the nursing program. Writing examinations, completing all assignments and other required tasks is compulsory.

A very good prior understanding of the physiology and associated anatomy of the organ systems being studied is ESSENTIAL for success in this course, as this forms the basis for studying pathophysiology. Due to time constraints, Anatomy and Physiology will NOT be reviewed or re-taught in this course. Students are required to review this information on their own prior to commencement of lectures on the appropriate organ system. While this is important for all students in class, those who did not complete anatomy and physiology (A&P) recently (i.e. as scheduled in the nursing program for the current cohort) and students who achieved less than 75% in these courses generally find this essential. You may choose to review your previous A&P textbook and material, or we also recommend that you review the various A&P related chapters in your pathophysiology textbook as highlighted in the course schedule. Ongoing review of foundational concepts studied in Biol 252 is not only strongly recommended for success in this semester, but it will also be vital for success in the following semester in Biol 253.

Course content is made available via several sources including lectures, class discussions, textbooks, websites, assignments and clinical practice. This course outline lists all the topics that will be studied. You are strongly encouraged to review each topic in the textbook (based on the course schedule of topics) before classes and to consolidate information obtained in lectures with that in the textbook after each class.

BIOL 252 is both content and concept driven, with a large volume of new information to deal with. In addition, the course involves skills that some may not be adequately experienced in e.g. critical thinking, problem solving, assimilating and applying information, and working with clinical scenarios. Since these skills develop with practice over time, applying them regularly to course content is important. Class discussions and your textbooks are good resources for clinical scenarios. Refer to the online resources accompanying the books.

According to current college policy, students may not use recording devices in the classroom without prior written permission from the Instructor. When the use of a recording device is sanctioned by the College's Center for Assisted Learning to accommodate a student's learning, the Instructor must be provided with an Instructor notification letter that specifies the use of a recording device and a recording agreement needs to be completed and signed by the student (contact the Instructor for this). Recordings made in the classroom under this accommodation are strictly for the student's personal use only, and distribution of recorded material in any form or on any forum is prohibited. All recorded materials must be permanently deleted/destroyed at the latest on the day following the final exam in the course.

Based largely on the college's privacy guidelines, recordings of lectures will not be provided for asynchronous, individual study.

You are encouraged to consult the course Instructor if you require assistance. While the Instructor is willing and able to assist with understanding course content and directing you to appropriate resources, they cannot do the work for you. The responsibility lies with the student to source out and utilize resources that best suit their study needs. Do not wait until just before or after an examination to do this.

SCHOOL OR DEPARTMENTAL INFORMATION

Ensure that you have the necessary prerequisites for BIOL 252 and that you are enrolled in all co-requisite courses. Any student not enrolled in a full nursing course load for the current semester MUST inform the Instructor of this by September 18th. Note that BIOL 153 is a prerequisite for BIOL 252 while NURS 232, NURS 260 and NURS 280 are co-requisites. These requirements are checked, and any student enrolled without them will likely be de-registered from the course if formal transfer credit or co-requisite waiver was not obtained.
