CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course explores the globalization of products and services. It introduces the constantly evolving realities of global business and helps students tackle the challenges of a complex multicultural, and a globally competitive environment. Students will study global business issues such as economic, financial, cultural, political, and legal issues affecting the global business strategies.

Prerequisites

All of:

- C in any ECON course
- C in any School of Business 200-level course

Or all of:

• Bachelor degree from a recognized post-secondary institution

Notes: It is recommended that students complete at least 20 courses of the Bachelor of Business Administration or Bachelor of Sport & Fitness Leadership or Bachelor of Sport Management program. Only one of BUS 260 or BUS 360 may be used towards a Camosun College credential. This course is intended to establish a sound understanding of international business and the factors within our dynamic global environment.

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- Assess the impact of globalization on world markets for resources, goods and services and explain how international factors explain domestic concerns.
- Explain how the complexities of culture affect international business processes.
- Conduct secondary research on key economic indicators and market potential indicators to assess a country's attractiveness.
- Assess the impact of economic, legal, and political systems on international business.
- Identify factors contributing to political or overall risk and identify approaches to managing it.
- Demonstrate an understanding of trade theories and regional economic integration in order to categorize the different regional trading groups.
- Compare and contrast the positive and negative consequences of foreign direct investment.
- Explain the fundamentals of monetary systems and international financial markets.
- Identify various entry modes to foreign markets.
