# CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Popular culture is all around us. This course opens our eyes to its existence and explores its influence, particularly in media. The impact of media on culture, and vice versa, is critically assessed and the emerging discipline of cultural theory is used to examine popular culture. Examples of topics include the relationship of popular culture with power, class, race, gender and sexuality, identity, postmodernism and globalization, and how these are represented in media.

- Describe popular culture and discuss its relationship with power, class, cultural imperialism, race, gender and sexuality, identity, post-modernism and globalization;
- Discuss how culture influences different forms of popular culture.
- 2. Explain the core theoretical concepts of popular culture.
- Explain how media such as music, TV programs, films and magazines can reflect popular culture in society;
- Describe the different theoretical approaches used to understand popular culture.
- 3. Demonstrate the relationship between concepts and practice in the media studies field.
- Examine a popular culture artifact and/or event and and explain its cultural context.
