# COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECATIONS

It is important to attend class, arrive on time and participate in the discussions and activities. Please let your instructor know via email as soon as possible to inform them of your absence. Your ability to thoughtfully participate in the class will be greatly facilitated by doing the pre-readings prior to class.

Repeated absence from class times will be discussed with the student. Successful course completion will be jeopardized if more than 15% of class time is missed (e.g., 6.75 hours for a 3-credit/45 hr course.

All project, papers and other learning activities are expected to be on-time. If an assignment is late, 5% per day that it is late will be deducted from your mark for that assignment. In exceptional circumstances, students can request an extension, but this must be arranged and approved by the instructor in writing (email is best) at least 48 hours before the assignment is due. Typically, only one extension is given per student per semester.

All assignments are submitted through D2L and must be typed double spaced with a cover page that includes:

- Course name
- Assignment title
- Your name and date
- Spelling, grammar, APA formatting and presentation of material will be taken into consideration

• Paper to be saved as a Word file with your name and not simply the course number.

C is the minimum grade for successful completion of CFCS 210. All assignments must be completed to this standard in order for students to complete the course requirements.
