Course guidelines and expectations

It is important to attend class, arrive on time and participate in the discussions and activities. Please let your instructor know via email as soon as possible to inform them of your absence. If you miss more than one class or arrive late more than one time, your success in the course will be in jeopardy and your instructor may request a meeting to discuss your absences.

If an assignment is late, 5% per day that it is late will be deducted from your mark for that assignment. In exceptional circumstances, students can request an extension, but this must be arranged and approved by the instructor in writing (email is best) at least 48 hours before the assignment is due. No more than one extension per student is typically granted by the instructor.

Written assignments are to be submitted via D2L in word or pdf files only (no Pages docs). Assignments should be written in APA format with title and reference pages. Please note that writing, grammar, style and structure will account for 25% of all written assignments.

All assignments and learning activities must be completed within 24 hours of the last day of instruction. This includes assignments, pre-class assignments and activities, participation in skill development/labs/group presentations, presentation attendance/responses and reflections, written check ins, missed class assignments, and any other items deemed necessary to submit by the instructor to complete the course.

C is the minimum grade for successful completion of CSEA 115. All assignments must be completed in order for students to complete the course requirements.
