COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

Journals:

Short Stories: You will write 3 short stories over the term. This is what you signed up for, right? I will read and give detailed feedback on each of the stories if they are handed in on time.

There are six journals: Each journal is based on one aspect of writing, so they are designed to help you explore different parts of the writers' tool box. In the past, students have used the journals as a starting point for stories they wrote both for the class and after the class is completed.

Workshops: Twice in the term you are going to workshop a piece of your writing. Workshopping your writing is an important step in the writing process. It's a way to get other eyes on your story and get feedback from a reader before you complete your writing. This term you will workshop two pieces of no more than 1000 words. That could be a section of one of your short stories, or something from one of your journals.

How Instructor Feedback Works:

Assuming that you hand your in work on time, I will read and provide detailed feedback on each of your three stories. I will do the same for your journals. Twice in the term, you can revise and resubmit an assignment within 10 days to the SAME drop box for a revised grade. Unfortunately I won't be able to give you any more feedback. (That's a workload issue, people. I am teaching 4 writing classes this term).

Assignment Guidelines

For all of your assignments for this class, please keep the following in mind
 Unless otherwise noted (for example Short Story #1) in terms of genre and audience, it's wide open.
 As long as you are writing prose and using the conventions of fiction (dialogue, scene, etc), you can

write realism, fantasy, mystery, etc. and you can write for adults or young adults or even middle grade kids.

- Please do NOT write extreme violence (NO rape scenes) or graphic sexual content.
- Please do NOT write erotica.
- Please do NOT use the names of your classmates in your stories.
- Please write on topics that are of interest to others, not just yourself. (I have read far too many drunken party stories over the years, for example).
- Please remember that we are writing fiction, so whatever you write should be a fictional account. You may write in 1st or 3rd person unless otherwise noted.
- I am always looking for fresh ideas, characters and expressions. Try to avoid clichés of thought, character and language.
- People, PLEASE get control of your grammar. A few grammatical errors sprinkled here or there are
 forgivable--we all make mistakes--but not understanding grammar is a different story. While it is true
 that grammar is a convention, and it is also true that fiction writers manipulate grammar to fit their
 needs, you need to have a deep understanding of grammar and how and why it works before you
 can manipulate it effectively. If that is you--then by all means, play around. If you are uncertain, then
 stick to the standards.
- While we're on the topic, please keep control of your tenses. It doesn't matter if you write in the past tense or the present, but choose one and stick to it. Having tense shifting around is very confusing.
- Please follow the formatting guidelines we discuss in class.

This course is a safe, inclusive, non-judgmental and respectful space. We draw on the work of Daniel Heath Justice, who encourages us to tell stories of complexity, hope and possibility, not stories of deficiency. This is a place of healing and of learning. This holds true for people of all races, genders, and abilities.

Complete all assignments by the deadlines. The assignments for this class are designed for you to practice the skills we are learning this term. For that reason, it is important to follow the guidelines of the assignments as closely as possible, and to give yourself enough time to work on each assignment. There are several services at Camosun College that are designed to help you succeed in your coursework, including your assignments. To give your self the best chance of succeeding in your classes, take advantage of these services:

- 1. The Writing Centre: for appointments of up to 30 minutes for help with assignments
- 2. The English Help Centre: for support in organizing yourself to write your assignments
- 3. WriteAway: on-line access to a librarian for help with research
- 4. The Student Learning Success Guides: for help with general student issues such as how to prepare for assignments and exams.

If you cannot complete the assignment on the due date, you have 1 week grace period to get it in. If you hand your paper in after the official due date, I will read it but not comment on it. After a week, I will no longer accept the assignment, unless we have made alternate arrangements. If you have questions either about the assignment or about my comments on your assignment, please come to my office hours or arrange a time to come and see me. My office is Paul 328.
