You will learn to focus on sensory details and memories so they can be shaped into a story, personal essay, memoir, poem or monologue. You will participate in an inclusive writing community of Canadian, Indigenous and international voices and perspectives and investigate how stories are shaped by the social and cultural context of the times.

- 4. Create detailed, organized narratives in a form suitable to the story, such as memoirs, short stories, orature or poems;
- 5. Conduct research and use correct documentation appropriate to writing personal narratives;
- 6. Edit and revise their own work and the work of others as part of the creative process of writing; and
- 7. Respond critically and respectfully to the ideas of others through discussion and writing
