CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

In this course, students develop their skills in the composition of poetry. Students will study and practice elements such as traditional and experimental forms, figurative language, and the creation of voice. Students will prepare to share their work with an audience.

Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

Write poems that are well-crafted.

Identify the writing techniques used in the crafting of a poem.

Develop a writing process using journaling, free-association exercises, drafting, work-shopping, revising, and editing/proofing.

Vary poetic style purposefully using concrete and abstract language, structure, point of view, syntax, rhythm, sound, image, and metaphor.

Use a variety of poetic strategies including the lyric and the narrative.

Use a variety of forms including fixed forms, blank verse, and free verse.

Read diverse, established poets to identify their poetics.

Read their own poetry to an audience of peers.

Identify the process and avenues for poetry submission.

COURSE SCHEDULE, TOPICS, AND ASSOCIATED PREPARATION / ACTIVITY / EVALUATION

The following schedule and course components are subject to change with reasonable advance notice, as deemed appropriate by the instructor.

The course uses Writing and Workshopping Poetry: A Constructive Introduction as a guide. Each week, we will focus on particular poems included in the book, and I'll let you know which ones in advance. You will also be given exercises and prompts for creating poems.

The course includes the following: reading the chapters as assigned in the text (Guppy), discussing specific published poems, responding to prompts, doing exercises, writing poems, reading and commenting on other students' poems, reading work aloud, learning terminology and techniques, participating in class discussions, and doing whatever else we can think of to develop appreciation for poetry and skills to create it. Discussions may be in small or large groups.

A typical 80-minute class includes time spent on the fundamentals including terminology and strategies, discussion of a poem (or poems), and creative exercises. We will be considering *Writing and*

Workshopping Poetry mostly in order, but as there is no clear path to writing poetry (apart from reading as much poetry as possible and trying to write it), I encourage you to jump around in the book. It is a useful resource.

Remember that writing poetry is a creative endeavour, and like any endeavour, knowing what has been done may help you to develop your own skills.

Information will be given in class and posted on D2L.

Please note that the poetry assignments are specific. For example, you may have to write, for example, a sonnet or a villanelle (don't worry—we will cover what those are) or a poem on a particular subject. And all poetry, I believe, has a form, whether the poem is written in a traditional form or in free verse (does not rely on meter or rhyme scheme). (Again, don't worry—we will cover that.)

- You are expected to attend class, arrive on time, and be prepared, having done the required reading. Participation marks cannot be earned if you are absent or you are unprepared.
- Turn off all devices. Make notes by hand. If you have a compelling reason to have your phone on, just let me know why at the beginning of the class.
- At times, the use of devices will be permitted, but until then, keep them off (unless you have arranged to have your device on or you have an accommodation from CAL).
- All work submitted must be your own and must be done for this class (no recycling of poems you have already written).
- Guidelines for poems will be given in advance of due dates.
- Late work is not normally accepted.
- The course has no make-up work or extra assignments for extra grades.
- Extensions may be given at my discretion, but must be negotiated before the due date, and they are not guaranteed to be granted. You need a good reason.
- Email is answered usually within 24 hours except for weekends and holidays.
- Put the course name (CRWR 156) in the subject line of email to me.
- Any material that I hand out in class will also be put on D2L (e.g., assignments and extra information), but this course is not designed as an online course. In-person participation is vital.
- I urge you to make friends with other students. Friends are important. They are also a source of help if you need to be absent for any reason. I cannot reproduce missed classes, so it's up to you to get notes from another student.
- The class is a mix of lecture, small group discussion, large group discussion, and writing.
- The course requires that you share your work with other students.
- Your writing may be used to exemplify points I wish to make in class. I will do so anonymously when possible, but you will need to share your work with the class.
- The class does not focus on grammar as it is assumed that you have basic skills. Common problems will be identified and explained.
- Developing your writing requires practice. This course offers you the chance to practice and play with words.
- Everyone needs help sometimes. Please see me if you are struggling, and we can try to find a way forward. I want you to succeed. I also want you to have fun.
