CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Students in this course will explore current issues facing criminal justice today; major themes in the course include the overrepresentation of Indigenous peoples, drug prohibition, harm reduction, mental health, prolific offenders and crime myths. Media influence on perceptions of crime and justice policy is examined. Students will explore policy analysis practice through group work and oral presentation skills.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

Students will be provided detailed guidelines for each assignment in class and on D2L.

The mid-term exam will be written in class on February 12th.

The paper written on either Campbell's *Halfbreed,* or Johnson's *Peace and Good Order* will be due on March 5th.

The in-class assignments will be done on random dates. These assignments will be done either individually or in pairs. The instructor will provide directions as to how they are due – either hard copy in class or on D2L. If a student is not in class on the dates of the in-class assignments, the student forfeits those marks. At the end of the semester, students will be given an opportunity to make-up for one missed in-class assignment.

Students will write a mid-term exam and final exam. The exams will be based on the material covered to date including lectures, discussions, videos, and readings. Exams will be a combination of multiple choice, true/false, and short answer questions. Students will have 80 minutes of class to complete the mid-term exam. Similarly, the final exam will be 80 minutes. The final exam will <u>not</u> be cumulative other than broad concepts that carry over from the first half of the course. The mid-term exam will be worth 20% of your final grade and the final exam will be worth 20% of your final grade.
