CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course introduces students to topical issues facing criminal justice such as the overrepresentation of aboriginal peoples, drug prohibition, harm reduction and crime myths. Media influence on perceptions of crime and justice policy is examined. Students are introduced to policy analysis, group work and oral presentation skills.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

The mid-term exam will be written in class on February 15th.

The paper written on either Campbell's *Halfbreed*, or Johnson's *Peace and Good Order* will be due on March 7th.

The in-class assignments will be done on random dates. These assignments will be done either individually or in pairs. The instructor will provide directions as to how they are due – either hard copy in class or on D2L. If a student is not in class on the dates of the in-class assignments, the student forfeits those marks.

Students will write a mid-term exam and final exam. The exams will be based on the material covered to date including lectures, discussions, videos, readings, etc. Exams could be a combination of multiple choice, true/false, and/or short answer questions. Students will have 80 minutes of class to complete the mid-term exam. Similarly, the final exam will be 80 minutes. The final exam will not be cumulative other than broad concepts that carry over from the first half of the course. The mid-term exam will be worth 20% of your final grade and the final exam will be worth 20% of your final grade.
