COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

All assignments must be completed to meet requirements of this course.

Review posts on Monday on D2L to ensure you are prepared for class each Friday. Additional readings, slides and other information will be provided.

Participation (10%)

You are expected to attend each class and be prepared to contribute to discussions on the readings assigned for each week. We will explore information throughout the course that you will be expected demonstrate a working knowledge of during discussions and group work. You will provide a self-assessment for participation at the end of the course for my review and consideration of grade assignment for participation.

Written Assignment Requirements

All assignments must be handed in during class time week they are due. Drop box submission will also be provided. If you anticipate the timely submission of work will be problematic, please let me know in advance of the due date. Unless otherwise directed, all written assignments must be type-written, single sided, double spaced and formatted in APA style.

Reflective Journal Assignment (15%)

From Week1 to end of Week 6 you will write a short personal reflection based on the class, readings, and material discussed in class. You will focus on 4 key questions to reflect on weekly and any other reflections, thoughts or aspirations you want to share in your journal. The 4 questions are:

- 1. Three key points or insights can include more than 3
- 2. Two questions or wonderings
- 3. One personal reflection and example
- 4. A principle or practice you plan to use, how and why?

This assignment is not in APA format and is written in 1st person.

Mid-term Exam 20% - Week 8

Students will write an in-class mid-term exam based on the material covered to date including lectures, class discussions, videos, and readings.

Thought Paper (15%) - Week 10

After completing Weeks 1 to 7, you will write a 2 to 3 page Thought Paper on your preferred conflict style, approach and practices you plan to develop and use in the future. Share any learnings or thoughts on styles and skills and your goals. Thought Paper to be written in 1st person and no APA required.

Restorative Justice Case Study Group Presentation (15%) Week 11

Each group will be assigned a case study to review and present to the class, comparing a restorative approach versus traditional justice practice. The presentation will be 10 minutes with a class discussion to follow each presentation. A 2-page summary of the presentation to be submitted to the drop box. Additional information will be provided in class.

Group Interview Project 20% - Due Week 13 and 14 as assigned

Working in groups of three, you will organize, prepare, and conduct an interview with a professional working within a specific area of alternative dispute resolution, arbitration, mediation, negotiation or restorative justice as assigned. This interview will take place in our classroom and will focus on the area of justice assigned to the interviewee as it relates to the concepts we have studied in this course. Details will be discussed in class and posted to D2L. Each group is to post an academic article on the type of justice practice to D2L the week prior to your presentation, for the class to read to prepare for the session. A summary of the presentation and learning to be submitted to D2L after the session.
