Bases of Student Assessment

(a) Two examinations (50%)

Examination 1 – February 28, 2024 (25%)

Examination 2 – Exam week (25%)

Each will examine your recollection/understanding of the content from the assigned readings and class lectures/materials. Exam 1 will be based on materials from weeks 1 to 6. Exam 2 will be based on materials from weeks 8 to 14, except as otherwise indicated by the instructor.

The exams for this course are OPEN-BOOK exams. Further details will be provided by the instructor.

Failure to attend an exam will result in a mark of ZERO (0) on the exam.

(b) Case Battle and Mock Appeal Hearing (40%)

The class is divided into teams in which part of the team will play the role of Crown Counsel and part of the team will play the role of defence counsel. Team sizes will depend on the number of students registered for the course.

The group finds a criminal case from the trial level. That case must relate to one of the topics covered in this class. The result of that case will be appealed by either Crown or defence, depending on the outcome of the case. The "Appellant" is the side that is seeking to appeal the original case. The other side is the "Respondent".

The Appellant will submit a copy of the case to the instructor and identify the issue(s) that is (are) being appealed.

And then the battle begins!

The Appellant and Respondent will prepare written arguments outlining the key facts of the case (as they relate to the appeal) and their arguments on the issue(s) that is (are) being appealed. Written arguments will be submitted to the instructor, opposing counsel and the assigned judges.

Court dates (during class) will be assigned to each group. The Appellant and Respondent will prepare oral arguments to present to the panel of appellate judges. Those arguments should follow the written arguments but should also directly address the arguments submitted by opposing counsel.

The Appellant will present their argument first, followed by the Respondent. The Appellant will have a brief opportunity to "reply" to the Respondent's arguments. After the completion of the arguments, the hearing will be adjourned, and the panel of judges will have one week to write individual judgments. Whichever side receives more judgments in their favour WINS!

The rules, specific grading for each portion of the assignment, order of argument, and hearing dates will be clarified via handout later in the term.

(c) Participation (10%)

Regular attendance and active participation are expected of all students. For the purposes of your participation grade, you will be asked to submit to the instructor an assessment of your participation during the course. You will assess yourself in the following areas:

- 1. Attendance and punctuality.
- 2. Class preparation (completing assigned readings, videos and tasks/assignments in a timely manner i.e. when assigned/due).
- 3. Engaging with classmates during small group discussions.
- 4. Offering your thoughts/perspectives during lectures and large group discussions.
- 5. Maintaining a positive, constructive and respectful demeanor towards peers and instructor.

The instructor will make a final determination of the student's participation score, taking into account the student's assessment as well as the instructor's own assessment of the student's participation in the course.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

1. Class Preparation and Participation

You are expected to complete the assigned readings before coming to class. This often becomes increasingly more difficult as the semester moves along and as the completion of assignments and preparation for exams for all classes takes a great deal of your time. This is a content-heavy course with a substantial amount of reading to be completed, so you should devote time daily/weekly to completing the assigned readings and you should do so from the beginning of the semester.

It is expected that you will arrive on time, be attentive, non-disruptive, constructive and respectful. For example, using headphones, engaging in text messaging, looking at messages, surfing the internet or using any means of

disengaging with your classmates and the learning process is not accepted in this class. You will be asked to leave the classroom setting.

I welcome the use of laptops to take notes in class. However, should any student's use of a laptop become disruptive or distracting to other students, I will ask that student to leave the class. Should there be repeated incidents of laptops becoming distractions in class, I may prohibit their use for the remainder of the semester.

Late Penalty

All assignments must be completed and submitted on the date and at the time assigned. The penalty for late assignments will be 10% per day. An extension can be granted only with at least 72 hours' notice and will only be granted for good reason; supporting documentation may be required.

2. Course Completion Requirements

You **must** complete all evaluative requirements (two exams and case battle) to receive a passing grade in this course. In other words, if you miss an exam or do not submit a complete a component of the Case Battle and Mock Appeal, <u>you will receive an F grade</u>.
