In-class mini paper – 20%

On October 26th, you will spend the class time writing a mini research paper.

Well in advance of this date, choose a topic that you are interested in learning more about. Make sure your topic is related to our course material. Source a minimum of <u>3 academic journals articles or book chapters</u> to use as your sources for your mini paper. Print each of your sources and put your name on them as you will bring them with you on the date and handing them in with your mini paper. More details to come.

News article presentation and write-up – 20%

You will choose a current news article on gender and the justice system to use for this assignment. You can work alone or in a pair to present your article and the analysis of how it relates to course material. More details to come.

Reflective journal – 20%

Your reflective journal requires you to think deeply about the issues, topics and theories you are learning about in the course and connecting these ideas to your own life and experiences. This assignment is ongoing through the term and requires that you choose 10 topics/ideas/concepts/learnings/readings that you find most interesting and write your journal entry on these issues. Quiz – 10%, 15%, 15%

Each of the three quizzes will be written in class on the date reflected in the syllabus. They will be based on the material covered to that date. More details to come.
