1. Discuss the basics of research design and research methodologies relevant to dental hygiene practice.

- Describe the scientific research process
- Define what is considered to be evidence and how evidence is formulated through research
- Identify and describe the main components and types of research designs

2. Explain the principles of evidence-informed practice and apply these to dental hygiene practice.

- Explain the goals of research
- Define evidence-informed practice
- Identify various ways of knowing and note their limitations
- Explain why decolonization is necessary for learning about Indigenous knowledge systems and ways of knowing

3. Employ the process of obtaining evidence-informed research as it relates to dental hygiene.

- Identify and describe research strategies for systematic inquiry related to evidence based dental hygiene services
- Locate appropriate literature and evaluate sources of information
- Explore medical/dental data bases and search strategies
- Discuss indexing in Medline
- Discuss filtered vs non-filtered online data bases
- Describe contemporary research topics and various types of professional reports
- Discuss sources of support available for dental health research
- Explore importance of creating a focused research question
- Discuss and explore writing a PICO question/focused research question
- Perform computer/media search for background and foreground information

4. Evaluate professional and scientific literature relevant to dental hygiene practice.

- Examine part of a journal article (Abstract, introduction, review of existing research, purpose of the research, methods, findings, analysis/discussion of the findings, recommendations for dental hygiene practice, recommendations for future research)
- Recognize common errors in reasoning
- Describe the role of an ethics review board and how ethical principles are applied in research
- Explain how rigour is achieved in qualitative research
- Define internal and external validity
- Identify the main techniques used to assess reliability and validity
- Define critical thinking as it applies to dental hygiene research

 2. Critically appraise research articles
- Explain the steps for critically appraising research and research articles including
 - Research article checklists (Eg: CASP)
 - How to determine if an article is peer reviewed
 - Hierarchy of journal articles
 - Critically appraising open source journals
 - Author credentials
 - Study design
 - Methods and materials
 - Validity and reliability
 - Data collection, analysis, and presentation
 - Funding
 - Limitations
 - Evaluating internet websites and sources
 - Bias
 - Conflict of interest
 - Discuss the need to critique research
 - Explore writing annotated bibliographies
 - Explain the meaning of the results of quantitative and qualitative studies
 - Review statistical methods and presentation of statistical data within a research article
 - Discuss p value and confidence intervals
 - Compare and contrast statistical analysis as it pertains to various data and forms of research
 - Discuss presentation of statistical data in research article
 - Describe how to write a research critique

5. Apply the principles of information literacy and academic referencing to dental hygiene practice.

- Discuss the use of technology to access information in consideration of research ethics, copyright guidelines and approval

- Recall, explore and apply various citation styles for literature referencing
 - APA 7th edition
 - Vancouver style
- Discuss the process of writing and assimilating research for a narrative review
- Create an outline in preparation of writing a narrative review
- Review the concepts of academic writing

6. Apply research findings to dental hygiene practice.

- Explain the importance of a narrative (literature) review and when to conduct one
- Describe how to complete a narrative (literature) review
- Locate appropriate literature and evaluate sources of information
- Discuss and differentiate between a narrative review, literature review, meta analysis, and systematic review
- Conduct a narrative (literature) review on a specific dental hygiene topic
- Discuss how to apply the results of narrative review to dental hygiene practice
- Describe how dental hygienists can contribute to research updates in practice

7. Evaluate the application of evidence to dental hygiene practice

- Discuss evaluation process for implementing new practices based on evidence in dental hygiene practice
 - Evaluate what may be considered best evidence in practice
 - Discuss and explore statistical significance vs clinical significance and how they apply to clinical decisions in practice
 - Explore reflective practice in context of evidence-based practice
 - Discuss and explore the application of clinical practice guidelines in dental hygiene practice
 - Discuss timeline from research conducted to adopting to standard of care
 - Discuss challenges with knowledge translation and acquisition to implementation in clinical practice
