Adjunctive Caries Detection

- Discuss various technologies available for dental caries detection.
- Discuss the dental hygienist's scope of practice related to the use of adjunctive caries detection devices.
- Compare the various devices currently on the market for caries detection.

Dental Restorations and Dental Hygiene Practice

- Discuss the characteristics, benefits, drawbacks and safety of various direct and indirect dental restorative materials.
- Explain the composition, preparation, placement, and finish of common restorative, prosthetic, esthetic, and preventive materials.
- Discuss the dental hygienist's role in educating clients on the indications and rationale for a dentist to recommend various materials and techniques to restore a compromised dentition.
- Describe methods used to protect the integrity of various dental materials during assessment and implementation.

- Discuss the use of resin infiltration within the dental hygiene scope of practice.
- Describe resin infiltration and its role in dentistry in relation to dental hygiene scope of practice.
- Discuss dental restorative procedures in order to assist clients to make informed treatment decisions.
- Discuss the process of and determine the need for inter-professional communication and collaboration in the provision of dental hygiene care.

Clients with Special Needs (refer to schedule for individual topics)

- Analyze the elements of comprehensive dental hygiene care for clients with diverse dental and medical conditions.
- Develop appropriate strategies for providing comprehensive dental hygiene care for clients with diverse medical and dental considerations including physical, developmental, and psychological limitations and impairments.
- Develop appropriate strategies for providing comprehensive dental hygiene care for clients with diverse medical and dental considerations related to chronic diseases and conditions.
- Identify signs and symptoms of family and domestic violence and the dental hygienist's legal and ethical responsibilities for reporting.
- Explore the dental hygienist's role in advocating for the protection of vulnerable populations.
- Explore palliative dental hygiene care in complex/long- term care.
- Develop appropriate strategies for working within an interdisciplinary care team for residents in complex/long- term care.
- Analyze non-surgical strategies to manage advanced periodontal disease for diverse clients
- Analyze periodontal suture materials and techniques for placement and removal.
- Discuss armamentarium, materials, and technique for placement and removal of a periodontal dressing

Private Practice Transition

 Explore modifications to paperwork/documentation to transition into private practice

- Discuss Camosun College protocols for using condensed paperwork to document the ADPIE process.
- Discuss scheduling in private practice.
- Discuss strategies for effective delivery of comprehensive care in a timely manner
- Discuss potential issues entry-level dental hygienists may face when transitioning into practice
- Discuss fee for dental hygiene services in BC
- Discuss the challenges of the BCDA fee guide and dental insurance on the delivery of comprehensive dental hygiene care
- Discuss electronic software options for dental practice management including digital charting
- Discuss transitions into practice
- Demonstrate professionalism as a representative of the program and dental hygiene profession.
- Provide professional constructive feedback on the student experience in the DH program
