CLASS GUIDELINES & EXPECATIONS

I expect students to be mindful of and respectful of their relationships with each other, the Land, their and other's learning and funds of knowledge, and the whole community.

Reflections are an important process of learning, so I expect students to engage with themselves in critical thinking, brainstorming, highlighting, recording, and growing in their learning processes

It is expected that you will attend all classes and be engaged and ready to share your thoughts and ideas. That you come to class having read modules and course content. That you complete your assignments on time and contribute to the class community.

Attendance and Late Assignment Policy

This course is synchronous, and therefore consistent attendance, participation and engagement are a requirement. As per the course outline, a large portion of your grade is composed of participation and a learning journal that synthesizes content from readings, discussions and lectures. If you need to be absent for medical or emergency reasons please contact me right away. Students with multiple unexcused absences could be at risk of not passing the course. If you miss three classes, your instructor will contact you to schedule a meeting to discuss your capacity to meet learning outcomes for the course. Depending on the rationale for your missed classes, the program leader and/or ombudsman may be invited into this conversation.

Assignment Policy

Assignments are due on the assigned due date, unless otherwise arranged with your instructor **prior** to the due date. Extensions may be granted on a case-by-case basis, but need to be requested at least 48 hours prior to the due date. Approval is not guaranteed and is determined by the instructor. If you need to miss class for reasons out of your control (illness, ect) you may request to make up a maximum of 1 of the in-class journal entries. You must contact the instructor for the reflection prompt and submit it within 2 days of the missed class.

If you have not handed in an assignment on the due date, you must connect with your instructor to notify them you haven't handed it in and when you plan to. Assignments not handed in on the due date are subject to a **3% deduction per day**. The Assignments without extensions handed in later than 5 days late, could be subject to receiving 0.

All assignments must be completed at a minimum of a C+.

Plagiarism & Academic Dishonesty. If plagiarism, cheating, or academic dishonesty can be documented, the penalty will be an automatic "zero" on the assignment in question. Should you receive a mark of less than 50% on an assignment, you may request to rewrite and resubmit the assignment. Permission to resubmit an assignment is at the discretion of the instructor, rewritten assignments can receive a maximum grade of C+ (65%). This course must be passed with a 'C+' (65%) average to continue in the ELC Program.
