- 1. Explain fundamental concepts applicable to economic problems.
- 2. Analyze and calculate the impact of market conditions and/or government policies on market equilibrium.
- 3. Calculate and interpret elasticity as a measure of the responsiveness of demand or supply to changes in income, the product's own price, and price of other products.
- 4. Apply consumer theory to determine optimal quantity of goods purchased
- 5. Calculate various cost measures; and identify the relationship between them.
- 6. Explain how efficiency is impacted by different market structures and how markets reach equilibrium.
- 7. Explain and analyze the role of comparative advantage in international trade and explain effects of different trade policies.
- 8. Apply microeconomic reasoning to explain current events.

Interview Examination: This evaluation will be a 10 to 15 minutes interview with your instructor twice during the semester. The instructor will provide you with a broad question in advance, and you will have to answer the question during the interview. If you answer the question incorrectly, the instructor will provide you with leading questions to guide you to the correct solution. If you arrive at the correct solution with help from your instructor by the end of the interview, you should get a grade of 60% on this evaluation. If you arrive at a correct solution by yourself, you should get a much higher grade.
