CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Students are introduced to the principles of microeconomic analysis. They will learn how markets function and how changes in consumer preferences, production technology, and resource availability affect the prices and quantities of goods.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES / OBJECTIVES

1. Explain fundamental concepts applicable to economic problems.
2. Analyze and calculate the impact of market conditions and/or government policies on market equilibrium.
3. Calculate and interpret elasticity as a measure of the responsiveness of demand or supply to changes in income, the product's own price, and price of other products.
4. Apply consumer theory to determine optimal quantity of goods purchased
5. Calculate various cost measures; and identify the relationship between them.
6. Explain how efficiency is impacted by different market structures and how markets reach equilibrium.
7. Explain and analyze the role of comparative advantage in international trade and explain effects of different trade policies.
8. Apply microeconomic reasoning to explain current events.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

How to navigate this course

This is an in-person section. The class meets at 6 – 8:50 pm every Tuesday. The course material will be presented during the class time. All course related announcements and arrangements will also be made during class. The class time will be split between learning new material, answering questions, doing practice questions, and interactive activities.

You will find a companion course site on D2L. In the Content section you will find the power point lecture notes, and supplemental lecture videos. While the videos have been developed to be used by the online asynchronous sections, I have made them available to you as a supplemental resource. The access to lecture videos does not replace coming to class.

In this course we also use the publisher’s online platform, myeconlab. Here you will find an interactive study plan which I have customized for this course. All quizzes in this course are provided in the myeconlab platform. Registration instructions for myeconlab are provided in the course information module in D2L.

Quizzes:

Throughout the semester you will complete 7 quizzes on the MyEconLab platform. Each quiz covers approximately 2 chapters. The purpose of the quizzes is to help you keep up with the material and prepare for the exams and in-class activities. Before you attempt a quiz, I strongly encourage you to review the questions from the respective chapters in the Study Plan in MyEconLab. The Study Plan is interactive and provides you with solutions and explanations. I have customized the Study Plan based on the course coverage.

The quiz due dates and times are given in the course schedule above. Each quiz will open on a Monday and you will have until Monday of the following week to complete it.

The lowest two quiz marks will be dropped and the rest will determine your total quiz grade. You will have 3 attempts and unlimited time for each quiz (during the week when the quiz is open for completion). Your best attempt (of the three) will be used for your grade. You can review your quiz results in myeconlab at any time after submission.

There will be no-make-ups for missed quizzes. If you miss a quiz, it will count as one of your dropped quizzes.

In-class interactive activities (option 1):

Each week, starting in week 2 to week 13 of the semester (except on Feb. 11 and 18– weeks 6 and 7) we will have time set aside for an in-class interactive activity related to the topic currently covered in the course. This is an applied learning opportunity, where you will apply concepts and theories currently covered in the course to analyzing current events in the economy. For each interactive activity, I will select and post in D2L a short article or assignment that will be used as a basis for the discussion and will formulate several questions for discussion. You will have an opportunity to review the materials and the assigned task before class. During class, you will first address the discussion questions within your small team and then share with the rest of the class. Each person will also submit brief written answers to the discussion questions. The answers will be marked on a Pass/Fail basis. Marking criteria include familiarity with the assigned reading and applying respective course concept to address the discussion question. Answers generated by artificial intelligence will not be accepted.

Applied learning assignment (option 2):

For this assignment you will be assigned an applied research project where you will have an opportunity to apply concepts from the course in a real world scenario. The assignment will open in week 2 of the semester in D2L and will be due

Exams:

The midterm exam date and time is given in the course schedule above.

The final exam will be scheduled by Student Services and will take place online during the final exam period. The exams are not cumulative. The approximate coverage for each exam is as follows:

Midterm exam – Chapters 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6

Final exam – Chapter 16.3, 17, 19, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12

The exam questions are similar to the Practice Questions we cover in each chapter as well as the Quiz questions in MyEconLab. The exams are “open book”. Guidelines and suggestions about exam preparation will be discussed closer to the scheduled exam dates.

Academic integrity and use of artificial intelligence:

At the start of the course, everyone will have an opportunity to complete the Academic Integrity course through the Camosun Library (you will find instructions in D2L and I will also explain in class). The course provides explanations and examples of academic integrity. It is free and takes under an hour to complete online. You will receive 2 bonus marks upon submitting proof of completion (as outlined in D2L).

Artificial intelligence and its use in education (and elsewhere) have been widely discussed lately.
