CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Students are introduced to the principles of macroeconomic analysis. Using theoretical models of national income and business cycles, they will analyze the impact of government policy on interest rates and exchange rates, and economic growth.

PREREQUISITES: One of: C in Foundations of Math 11; C in Pre-calculus 11; C in MATH 077; C+

in MATH 072 or C+ in MATH 075

One of: C in English 12 or Camosun alternative (see Calendar)

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES / OBJECTIVES

- 1. Explain the income and expenditure approaches for measuring the economy's output; distinguish between real and nominal GDP.
- 2. Develop the aggregate expenditure model for a closed and an open economy in order to explain the multiplier effect and government fiscal policy.
- 3. Construct the aggregate demand and aggregate supply model and use them to explain short-run economic fluctuations, the impact of government monetary and fiscal policy, and the adjustment of the economy over time.
- 4. Explain the derivation of the unemployment and inflation statistics and determine the relationships between inflation, employment and income in the context of the macroeconomic models.
- 5. Analyze the short and long-run effects of government budget surpluses and deficits and the public debt on the economy.
- 6. Analyze currency markets and the balance of payments to determine a country's position in international markets.
- 7. Identify the factors contributing to long-run economic growth in the context of the different growth models.

Quizzes:

Throughout the semester you will take several quizzes on MyEconLab platform. Before you attempt a quiz, I strongly encourage you to review the questions from the respective chapters in the Study Plan and Dynamic Study Modules in MyEconLab.

The quiz due dates will be determined in class depending on topic coverage. The deadline and chapters for each quiz will be announced on D2L after the quiz posted on MyEconLab. You will be given about a week to complete each quiz.

The lowest two quiz marks will be dropped and the rest will determine your total quiz grade. You will have 3 attempts and unlimited time for each quiz – your best attempt (of the three) will be used for your grade. Each quiz is "open book" and you have unlimited time to complete it before the due date. You can review your quiz results at any time after the due date.

There will be **no-make-ups** for missed quizzes. If you miss a quiz, it will count as one of your dropped quizzes.

Exams:

The midterm exam dates are given in the course schedule above. The final exam will be scheduled by Student Services and will take place during the final exam period. The exams are <u>not cumulative</u>. Students will be allowed to bring 2 pages (1 sheet) of <u>hand-written notes</u> to use during exams. Higher percentage of final exam reflects the rigour and complexity of content. Review guidelines, practice questions and other details for each exam will be posted on D2L.

<u>Deadlines:</u> You must submit your assignments on the due date or as announced. A grade of zero will be assigned to late submissions. There are no additional assignments or make-up exams of any kind if you performed poorly on an assignment, midterm or final exam.
