CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Students will use the theories of national income to analyze the impact of shocks and economic policy on employment, inflation, growth, and the business cycle, for closed and open economies.

PREREQUISITES: C in Econ 103 C in Econ 104 One of: C in Math 100 or C in Math 108

- 1. Interpret major economic indicators and statistics like Gross Domestic Product, the Consumer Price Index, the GDP Deflator, and the unemployment rate.
- 2. Explain the level of GDP, its distribution, and long-run equilibrium using the model of national income determination.
- 3. Demonstrate the impact of the rate of saving, population growth, and technological progress on economic growth using the Solow growth model.
- 4. Derive the determinants of the steady state rate of unemployment, and analyze situations in which wage rigidity contributes to unemployment.
- 5. Explain the functions of money, the quantity theory of money, the inflation tax, and the Fisher effect.
- 6. Evaluate the impact of shocks to the economy and the role of stabilization policy using the aggregate demand and aggregate supply model.
- 7. Develop the IS-LM model from the Keynesian cross and the theory of liquidity preference and use the model to explain economic fluctuations.
- 8. Show how monetary and fiscal policy affects the economy under floating and fixed exchange rates using the Mundell-Fleming model.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

About this course

This is an in-person course. The majority of the course information and content are presented during class meetings. I use our online Learning Management System – Desire to Learn (D2L) - to provide supplemental information about the course. I encourage you to take the time at the start of the semester to review the course information and become familiar with the features and navigation options in D2L.

Careful time management is important for an intermediate-level course. At the start of the term, I encourage you to make a note of all due dates associated with the course and set appropriate reminders.

Throughout the term, I may use the News tool in D2L for course updates and announcements in-between class meetings, if necessary.

The D2L Content module contains the course outline, project guidelines and lecture notes. Each weekly module power point lecture notes that I will use in class and lecture videos from the previous delivery of the course. Note that the lecture videos are provided as a supplemental resource, they don't substitute coming to class.

The assignments will be posted in the Assignment tab. You can upload your answers online or bring a printed assignment in class.

The interim grades during the term are posted in D2L. The final letter grade for the course will be posted in myCamosun.

During the term, I may e-mail the whole class, if I need to send a quick announcement. However, e-mail is not an effective tool for addressing course content and course information and will not be used for those purposes. You can schedule online or in-person office hours in addition to my posted office hours above.

Assignments:

The assignments will help you to keep up with the material and prepare for the exams. Each assignment will cover 2-3 chapters. The assignment questions will be posted in D2L one week in advance of their due date. I will provide comments and feedback in class after I review the assignments.

Applied project:

The applied project focuses on analyzing the recent behaviour of a macroeconomic variable for the Canadian economy. You will work in a small team which will be assigned in the second week of the semester. The work on the project wills start by attending a library research class. Following that you will undertake your own research of the macroeconomic variable that is assigned to your team. You will prepare an annotated bibliography of your reference sources. The next step will be to conduct quantitative analysis, followed by qualitative analysis of your assigned macroeconomic variable using your reference sources. You will then prepare your presentation materials and share with the other teams in advance of the presentation. You will deliver the presentation as scheduled and finally, will provide feedback on the work of your team and the presentations of the other teams. You will receive feedback and suggestions after submitting your reference sources, after providing your presentation materials and after delivering the presentation. Detailed project information and marking criteria are available in D2L.

Exams:

The midterm exam date is given in the course schedule above. The final exam will be scheduled during the final exam period. Both exams are in-person open-book exams. The exams are not cumulative. The approximate coverage for each exam is as follows:

Midterm exam – Chapters 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, and 7

Final exam – Chapters 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13 and 14

More information about the exams will be provided closer to the exam dates.
