CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Students will be introduced to financial markets and institutions in theory and practice. Through lectures and in-class discussion forums, students will learn the economic role of money, development, organization, and regulation of the Canadian financial system. Case studies and practical applications will teach students the role of central banking, the conduct of monetary policy and financial assets, and exchange rates.

PREREQUISITES: C in Econ 103; C in Econ 104

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES / OBJECTIVES

- 1. Discuss the functions of money and the components of the money supply, in order to develop an understanding of the role of money and monetary policy in the economy.
- 2. Determine the major factors influencing the level of interest rates and use the theories of the term structure of interest rates to explain the shape of the yield curve.
- 3. Distinguish between nominal and real exchange rates; and show how exchange rates and interest rates are related.
- 4. Explain the process of money creation by banks and near-banks and determine the effects of changes in reserves on the deposit multiplier.
- 5. Analyze the risks that banks are exposed to and discuss the regulation of financial intermediaries.
- 6. Outline the functions of the Bank of Canada and the objectives of monetary policy as they affect the Canadian economy.
- 7. Explain how the central bank's tools for monetary policy affect the monetary base and the money supply.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

Quizzes and prerequisites:

MyEconLab quizzes are assigned for each week. The dates for each quiz will show on MyEconLab front page, and will also be posted on D2L "News" section few days before the deadline. Quiz grades will be stored in MyEconLab until the end of the term, after which the final quiz grades will be exported to D2L grade book to calculate final course grade.

Quiz set up features:

- 1. There will be no time limit placed on individual quizzes. In other words, you can save unfinished quizzes, come back and complete at your convenience. But there will be a cut off time and date. Usually, it is 11:59pm on Sundays.
- 2. There will be limited number of attempts for each quiz (3-4). The exact number is based on the rigour and/or the length of the quiz. The highest score will be recorded toward your grade.
- 3. At the end of the term, all non-submitted quizzes will be assigned grade "0" (zero).
- 4. Two worst quiz scores will be dropped and the rest will determine your total quiz mark.

Term Project:

A term project will be assigned after the midterm exam. It will cover some core topics/questions and will prepare you for the final exam. Format, deadline and submission will be discussed.

Exams:

The length of the midterm exam is 80 minutes, and it is 2 hours for the final exam. The midterm exam will be in class. The format of the final exam will be determined during the term.

Final exam is **NOT** cumulative. The higher percentage for the final exam reflects the rigour and the amount of the material covered after the midterm exam. The exam is open book.

<u>Deadlines:</u> You must submit your assignments on the due date or as announced. A grade of zero will be assigned to late submissions. There are no additional assignments or make-up exams of any kind if you performed poorly on an assignment, midterm or final exam.

1. a) EXAM DATES WILL NOT BE RESCHEDULED. Non-attendance on scheduled exam dates results in a zero grade. Exceptions will be made only for medical reasons or
