EACS 140 combines hands on, interactive course designed to provide foundational knowledge that will support you in your community practice. A variety of teaching and learning modalities including seminar presentations by the instructor and guest speaker(s), small and large group discussions, dyad and group projects, self reflective learning, self-directed study and audio-visual learning.

- a) It is important to attend class and arrive on time. If you are unwell, please let your instructor know via email as soon as possible. If you miss more than two classes or arrive late more than three times, your success in the course will be in jeopardy and your instructor may request a meeting to discuss your absences.
- b) Please arrive, prepared and ready to participate in the discussions and activities. Your ability to thoughtfully participate in the class will be greatly facilitated by doing the pre-readings prior to class.
- c) Instructions for assignments will be posted on D2L.
- d) Assignments are to be submitted via D2L in word or pdf files only. Assignments must be formatted as follows: 12pt. font of Calibri, Arial or Comic Sans; double-spaced; APA format; inclusion of title, student name and references. Please note that writing, grammar, style and structure will be considered in grading.
- e) Some reflection assignments will be done during class time and will be handed in at the end of class.
- e) All assignments are due by 11:59pm on the due date. Late assignments will lose 5% per day unless

- otherwise pre-arranged with the instructor. A request for an extension must be arranged and approved by the instructor in writing (email is best) at least 48 hours before the assignment is due. No more than one extension per student is typically granted by the instructor.
- f) C is the minimum grade for successful completion of EACS 140. All assignments must be completed to fulfill the requirements of the course. Assignments will not be accepted more than one week beyond the final class.
