EVALUATION OF LEARNING

This course focuses on promoting literacy skills by refining reading fluency through using longer text and exploring critical reading strategies including making inferences and drawing conclusions. Writings skills are developed through writing a variety of paragraphs and actively building vocabulary. Grading is according to the College’s Competency Based Course Grading Policy.

As writers, students will explore freewriting, drafting, outlining, editing, and proofreading processes as they write descriptive, narrative, and explanatory paragraphs with a variety of sentence structures. Students will further lifelong learning practices and gain an understanding of Indigenous ways of knowing and world views. Students will practice learning skills for oral communication.
Literature	In discussion and/or writing	Analyze characters in a short story and write a short book report
Stories and Passages	Multiple readings	Give written and oral responses to readings in Active Reader 5 and/or other selections
Letter(s)	Complete 1 more	Write at least one personal letter using standard format.
Opinion, Process, Descriptive, Narrative paragraph and/or a combination of paragraph modes	Write 7 or more	Generate and organize ideas and write paragraphs that include topic, concluding and support sentences.
Punctuation and Capitalization	In exercises and/or writing	Learn to recognize complete sentences. Apply capitalization and comma rules and basic punctuation including quotation marks.
Grammar	In exercises and/or writing	In writing and exercises, use complete sentences, consistent verb tense and subject - verb agreement.

This course uses the Competency Based Grading System on students' successful completion of the course learning outcomes.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

This is a self-paced course. Students have the flexibility to follow an individually-adaptable timeline to complete the learning outcomes and assignments. The course is a combination of 6 online, blended and/or in-person hours per week with an expectation of studying another 4 hours per week. Students have a responsibility to work hard, attend class and/or meetings, and ask for support when needed. Additional assignments may be required if needed.
