Students will use the basic rules of writing sentences and paragraphs. Students will develop reading comprehension and vocabulary and foster interest in reading. Students will practice learning skills for oral communication, critical thinking, social responsibilities, personal and cultural identity, and time and work management.

EVALUATION OF LEARNING

This course focuses on developing critical thinking skills to assess a range of readings. Students write and edit expository paragraphs using a variety of punctuation and grammatical structures. Students explore lifelong learning practices: goal setting, problem solving and internet searching. Students will build a portfolio of their work to be used as an evaluative tool in the assessment of their progress in the course.

The course is a combination of 6 online, blended and/or inperson hours per week with an expectation of studying another 4 hours per week.
