CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Students in this course will be provided practice and instruction in critical reading and be able to demonstrate creative and critical thinking. Students will practice and receive instruction in the planning, writing, and revising of paragraphs and essays, so as to prepare them for college writing. Students will also learn to gather, evaluate, synthesize, and organize information into a research paper as well as deliver a research-based oral presentation. This course prepares students for post-secondary academic English courses.

Note: English 092 combined with English 094 is equivalent to Provincial English 12.

PREREQUISITE(S): One of: C in English 11, C in ENGL 070

- paraphrase main ideas in written material
- distinguish between implicit and explicit messages
- apply prior knowledge and experience to assist understanding of new material
- use a variety of strategies and sources to gather and evaluate information, including print sources, library resources and the Internet
- interpret details and draw conclusions from information presented in a variety of print and graphic formats, including electronic formats

c. Written Communication

- plan and write a variety of paragraphs and essays
- edit and proofread own work
- monitor spelling, grammar, punctuation and syntax, using appropriate techniques and resources as required, including electronic technology
- write effectively, adjusting for audience, purpose, and situation
- organize information and ideas to clarify thinking and achieve desired effect

- understand and avoid plagiarism
- write one essay in class with no help from others (an exit essay)
- gather, evaluate, synthesize, and organize information into a research paper of approximately 1500 words using an appropriate documentation style (e.g. APA, MLA or Chicago)
- D. Speaking and Listening Skills
 - participate in class discussions and activities
 - adjust speaking style to suit audience, purpose, and situation
 - listen attentively and respond helpfully to oral presentations
 - consider effective presentation aids to enhance communications
 - deliver an oral presentation based on own research paper and carefully consider audience's questions and suggestions
 - demonstrate the complexity of issues and consider others' points of view respectfully
