CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course provides core critical thinking, reading, research and writing skills transferable to academic disciplines. Students practice various forms of academic writing, including summary, critical analysis, and written research. Analysis of textual rhetoric, discourse, and style, along with academic essay-writing, develops self-awareness of methods of inquiry, critique, and reflection.

Form critical responses to ideas.

- a) Distinguish between fact and opinion.
- b) Analyse and articulate the reasoning behind an argument.
- c) Demonstrate a critical examination of ideas through close reading, inquiry, divergent thinking, evaluation of evidence and interpretation, as well as an understanding of rhetoric, reason, logic and word usage.
- d) Produce writing under exam conditions, as well as outside class.
- e) Differentiate academic and non-academic writing.

- a) Approach writing as an active exploration of multiple perspectives on a topic.
- b) Compose effective summaries.
- c) Select and use rhetorical patterns purposefully.
- d) Employ a comprehensive writing process, which includes prewriting, focusing, planning, multiple drafting, conferring, revising and editing/proofing.
- e) Develop an argument with a controlling thesis; write unified, coherent paragraphs, including effective introductions, transitions and conclusions in correct, clear, effective English.
- f) Develop effective, focused research questions.
- g) Demonstrate control, clarity and cohesion in the development and organization of ideas.
- h) Vary style purposefully for planned rhetorical strategies.
- i) Write for specific results.
- j) Critique his/her own and others' writing.

Read and analyze complex texts from various academic disciplines.

- a) Vary reading approaches for different purposes, such as personal response, persuasion, and criticism.
- b) Participate and engage in a dynamic, stimulating exchange of ideas based upon close textual readings.
- c) Discuss and debate text using terminology appropriate to the discipline and context of those texts.
- d) Analyze textual readings, which may include visual texts, by identifying controlling ideas, supporting details, dominant rhetorical pattern, subtext, tone and stylistic features.
- e) Summarize readings to reflect coherently the original's ideas, purpose, organization, and tone.
- f) Critically read your own and others' writing.

Demonstrate information literacy skills.

- a) Determine the nature and extent of the information needed.
- b) Know and use what information resources are available, in different formats.
- c) Use print and electronic resources effectively and efficiently.
- d) Evaluate sources for authority, relevance, reliability, currency and other criteria.
- e) Incorporate and integrate research through correct use of summary, paraphrase and quotation.
- f) Document sources fully and ethically, according to specified bibliographic conventions.

Develop self-awareness as an academic writer and contributor.

- a) Articulate one's position in a critical debate of ideas.
- b) Reflect on one's own writing for continuous improvement.

Plagiarism, Cheating, and Al-Based Writing Tools

Plagiarism is a serious academic offense. Please ensure you submit your own, original work, which *you* have written for the assignments in this class.

Use of generative AI, like Chat GPT or translation programs, is prohibited for all course assignments; our course learning outcomes require individual (human) thought and application through all stages of the writing process. You may choose to use AI-based writing tools for practice and learning outside of class, but any work you generate with these tools must NOT be submitted for grading. Work that contains hallmarks of AI-generated text may be run through AI detection software (though the results will only be used to support other existing evidence—they will not be considered conclusive on their own.) Since submitting work that is all or partially composed by generative AI is a form of academic misconduct, the related assignment will receive a grade of zero and may elicit further consequences. Please review Camosun's policies on academic honesty and plagiarism.

Late & Missing Assignments

You must submit assignments on time. However, I will consider a request for extension if given *before* the due date. Late submissions without prior explanation will lose 10% if submitted within seven days of the due date and will lose 40% if submitted more than seven days after the due date. Late assignments will receive a grade only (no comments).
