CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course introduces the study of literature in English with a focus on genres: short fiction, novel, poetry, drama. Reading, writing, oral and interpretive skills necessary for analyzing literature are emphasized, including close reading, literary criticism, and terminology. Academic reading and essay writing skills, transferable to any discipline, are practised.

- Develop and argue, in an academic essay format, a coherent reading of a literary text;
- Select and integrate primary textual evidence that effectively supports an essay's argument;
- Integrate secondary sources where applicable;
- Use a scholarly essay form, including a thesis; topic sentences; argument and/or analysis; use
 of quotations; unified, coherent paragraphs and transitions; rhetorical strategies appropriate
 for purpose and audience; and effective introductions and conclusions;
- Use a critical approach with appropriate language and terminology;
- Produce writing under exam or exam-like conditions;
- Write clear, concise, effective prose, and know how to identify, as well as correct, common mechanical and grammatical errors.

Information Literacy Skills:

- Know and use what information resources available, in different formats;
- Use print and electronic resources effectively and efficiently;
- Evaluate sources for authority, relevance, reliability, currency, and other criteria;

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

Content Warning: This is a course focused on fiction, which is inherently intended to present readers with new, unusual, and sometimes challenging ideas. However, it is important to create a safe and welcoming class environment. I will be providing individual content warnings for texts as needed. These content warnings are intended to allow readers to prepare for material that might negatively impact their mental state. Texts will have individual content warnings, but generally, certain texts in the class contain discussions and depictions of death/dying, violence/gore, murder, political violence, child abuse/endangerment, psychological distress, intrusive thoughts/obsessive behaviour, eating disorders, paranoia, misogynistic attitudes, sexual harassment, ghosts/spirits, the afterlife, poverty, antiquated views of mental health, medical malpractice and abuse, and disregard for personal autonomy.

If the content discussed in these texts may upset you, please contact me to discuss any concerns, if you feel safe and comfortable doing so. If you need to discuss the content with a counsellor, you can contact Camosun College Counselling Services: http://camosun.ca/services/counselling-centre/. If I have overlooked troubling content in a specific text's content warning, I apologize sincerely and assure you that I will try to do better in the future. Any clarification that you feel safe and comfortable offering is welcomed and appreciated.

Assignment Expectations:

• All specific instructions and formatting requirements for assignments will be provided on their respective assignment sheets.

- <u>Assignment submissions</u>: Please submit assignments either as a paper copy submitted to me on the
 due date or as a digital copy submitted to the appropriate D2L drop-box by 11:59 pm (PST) on their due
 dates.
- <u>Due dates</u>: While I aim to be understanding, due dates are there to help us move through class at a smooth, manageable pace. If you need an extension, you must discuss it with me in-person, via a Zoom meeting, or via a phone call to me. I do not discuss requests for extensions by email alone. If an assignment is late without a formal extension, it will lose 5% per day, including weekends, until it is submitted. Late assignments will receive a grade, but no comments.
- Academic Integrity: The Camosun College's policy on Academic Integrity (https://camosun.ca/sites/default/files/2021-09/e-1.13.pdf) defines it this way: "Academic integrity is the commitment to and demonstration of honest and ethical behaviour in an academic setting. It is the performance of all academic work without cheating, plagiarizing, lying, stealing, inappropriately collaborating, falsifying information, or receiving unauthorized assistance from any other person or using any source of information not appropriately authorized or attributed" (Camosun College, 2). As Camosun's policy further states, "Academic integrity is the responsibility of the entire College community" (Camosun College, 2). I take my responsibility in this regard seriously, and all suspected instances of academic misconduct will be addressed by me. If you have difficulty completing assignments, please do not engage in unethical academic behaviour. Instead, contact me for help. My main responsibility is to your academic well-being, and I aim to be understanding.
- Generative AI: I do not recommend the use of generative AI programs in your work. I can see a place for working with these tools in creative and ethical ways. However, for me, they must be the tool rather than the artist, so to speak. These tools write essays that tell me and you nothing about yourself and your thoughts. I would rather have an imperfect essay where I see you thinking, trying, and working things out than bland, smooth monotony. These tools also consistently produce information that uses uncited research or creates false citations. This could lead to allegations of fraud under Camosun's Academic Integrity policy. Further, if you do use any generative AI, its work is not your work. As such, you must put its words in quotation marks to let me know they are not your words, and you must provide a proper citation. If you don't do this citing, it is plagiarism. The Camosun Library has produced a guide to help you in citing such tools: https://camosun.libguides.com/ai/citation. However, thinking your own thoughts and struggling slightly to produce your own work is far more interesting and far more valuable to you than outsourcing your thinking to a computer program. Developing your critical and creative skills first will lead to you more effectively and ethically using these tools when that time comes.

Class Environment:

• This course is an inclusive, non-judgmental, and respectful space. I want our class to be a shared environment wherein we are all learners and collaborators; it is a place where we have fun, learn, and express ourselves. New knowledge is gained when we learn collaboratively and feel connected. Respect for each other, and the many divergent views we will encounter in this course, is a requirement for all participants. We will disagree with one another, but disrespectful language and actions are not tolerated. Please practice tolerance, judgment, maturity, politeness, and respect in all interactions and communications with your fellow learners and with your instructor. Interpreting literature is a personal experience. If you find that any texts or discussion comments are troubling to you, please let me know, to the extent you feel safe and comfortable doing so, so that you can be well supported.

- Participation will be essential to creating a classroom. Being comfortable sharing your views and learning from others can take time, but it will benefit your learning and communication skills. Be curious, record your observations, questions, and ideas as you read, reflect on what we read and discuss, ask questions, and develop your critical thinking skills. As stated, part of your participation is coming to class prepared by reading class texts before the class during which they will be discussed.
- Please practice polite tech etiquette: Devices and computers, including smartphones, may be used in class only as required for an instructor-directed activity or assignment (e.g., research or in-class writing), or if your CAL designation includes use of a computer. Please mute your devices. Please no texting, calls, or social media use during class time. You will be asked to leave the class if you are doing these activities. If you must answer a call, text, or message for personal reasons, please quietly excuse yourself from class to do so.
- <u>Communication outside class</u>: Check your email and D2L email regularly (and possibly consider linking these accounts, which you must do through D2L), to keep connected to this class. To contact you via email, I will use the email address provided to me via myCamosun, which is the email you used to register for classes with; if you do not receive an email message from me within the first week, please let me know. You can also connect with me via email or during my office hours listed above.
