Integrate secondary sources where applicable;

Use a scholarly essay form, including a thesis; topic sentences; argument and/or analysis; use of quotations; unified, coherent paragraphs and transitions; rhetorical strategies appropriate for purpose and audience; and effective introductions and conclusions;

Use a critical approach with appropriate language and terminology;

Produce writing under exam or exam-like conditions;

Write clear, concise, effective prose, and know how to identify, as well as correct, common mechanical and grammatical errors.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

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On the outline you will find a course syllabus – a weekly breakdown of work required.

This is NOT a self-paced course. Though presented asynchronously, students are expected to commit the same number of weekly hours (two hours and forty minutes) per week to posted content and weekly readings. You can log it at your convenience, but you'll need to be very disciplined about keeping pace with the course material from week to week. I strongly recommend setting aside regular times that suit your schedule – at least twice a week – to work through the course material.

I will post audio material as we go along for each module. Hence it is best to follow the weekly schedule and to check in regularly. Students that work ahead might well miss the audio lectures as I post these as we move through the course material. These will be vital supplements to the textual course material. As we move along there might well be changes to the syllabus. These will be posted under the NEWS tab on the main course page.

One complication to an online course is that you are working on the readings largely on your own, so these supplemental audio recordings are crucial to helping you follow the course material.

As this course is taught online, you are not required to be present on campus. However, the course does have an **on-campus** final exam. The date and time of the exam will be set by the college – and I will post this when it is scheduled.

How do I get help over the term with course material?

It is usually best to use internal D2L email to contact me as I tend to reserve my regular email for my in-class students. My regular email is mehta@camosun.ca should you need it.

I try to respond to messages in a timely fashion, but since I receive many messages each day, I ask that you use e-mail prudently and allow at least 48 hours for a reply. I usually do not respond to emails at the end of the day or on weekends.

I have office hours on campus (Paul 318) on Wednesdays from 9-10:00AM (do book an appointment though – just in case I have other students lined up). If that is not convenient, let me know and we'll schedule a time that works for the both of us.

How do I start the course?

Note if you need help navigating D2L, there is a guided online tutorial on the upper left menu of the D2L page when you log in.

Begin the course by noting the course modules and content (MY TOOLS>CONTENT).

We follow the text closely – the course is largely arranged around the assigned readings.

This course introduces the study of literature in English with a focus on genres: short fiction, the novel, poetry and drama. Reading, writing and interpretive skills necessary for analyzing literature are emphasized, including close reading, literary criticism, and terminology.

This course presumes fluent post-secondary level standards of composition, revision, editing, research, and documentation. This is NOT a formal grammar course, and we assume your writing is cogent and correct. This course introduces the methods and conventions of academic argumentation and research (see grading rubric for essays below).

Assignments

Due dates and assignment descriptions are posted under MY TOOLS>ASSIGNMENTS.

Upload assignments as .pdf documents. Assignments in any other format will be penalized 5%.

Problems with online access, software and printing, travel issues, etc., will NOT be accepted as reasons for lateness or extensions.

All assignments are to be submitted in 12-point, Times New Roman. Submissions must follow the format of MLA style.

Assignments are due on the dates/times specified. Late assignments will not receive comments but will be assigned a grade. Assignments handed in late are docked 10% per day till the fourth day (including weekends) at which point the assignment will receive an F grade.

Note too that the deadline is 11:30PM of the day an assignment is due. All time references in the course are in Pacific Daylight Time (PDT). If you are in another time zone, you are responsible for submitting your assignments by the time specified in PDT.

There are no make up assignments or options.

Comments on essays can be found the comment box where you uploaded your assignment. So there is some uniformity in the nature of my comments, I use a grading rubric for each assignment.

Rubric for Essay Grades

We assume correctness on the level of language and grammar and focus comments on organization, use of evidence, critical thinking, and style.

Merely fulfilling the basic requirements for an assignment, and doing so in a competent, reasonable manner is generally only enough for a grade in the 'B' range. 'A' grades will only be awarded when work demonstrates notable excellence. There is no difference in other words, between an 'A' and a 'B' paper save on matters of content (having original ideas). If you make sentence mistakes, you should not expect B or A grades in this course:

An "A" level grade marks an assignment that anticipates and responds to possible reader questions (counterarguments), uses a wide range of supporting evidence, engages the reader in a provocative conversation, provides unexpected insights (is original), and typically uses language with outstanding facility.

A "B" level grade highlights a strong example of college writing and thinking. In addition to meeting the "C" level requirements, such an essay goes further in some way(s): it demonstrates some insight into the "gray areas" of the assignment, reads smoothly at both the sentence and paragraph levels, and/or exhibits a personal "voice" or style. It has no sentence-level errors.

A "C" level grade denotes average college-level writing and achievement. The writing is a competent response to the assignment: it meets, to some degree, all the assignment requirements, and demonstrates that the author has put significant time and effort into communicating ideas. It moves from point to point in an orderly fashion; sentence-level errors do not significantly prevent comprehension. Essays that do not meet these criteria will not earn a "C."

"D" level essays do not meet the basic expectations of the assignment.

"F" level grades are assigned to essays that are not completed
