This course introduces the study of literature in English with a focus on genres: short fiction, novel, poetry, drama. Reading, writing, oral and interpretive skills necessary for analyzing literature are emphasized, including close reading, literary criticism, and terminology. Academic reading and essay writing skills, transferable to any discipline, are practised.

- Use literary and analytical terms correctly (e.g. metaphor, irony, character, setting, and plot);
- Compare and contrast themes and issues;

• Develop appropriate interpretive skills where non-print kinds of texts are studied (film, visual, audio, digital, multi-media);

- Demonstrate the difference between paraphrase and analysis;
- Develop and argue, in an academic essay format, a coherent reading of a literary text;
- Select and integrate primary textual evidence that effectively supports an essay's argument;
- Integrate secondary sources where applicable;

• Use a scholarly essay form, including a thesis; topic sentences; argument and/or analysis; use of quotations; unified, coherent paragraphs and transitions; rhetorical strategies appropriate for purpose and audience; and effective introductions and conclusions;

- Use a critical approach with appropriate language and terminology;
- Produce writing under exam or exam-like conditions;

• Write clear, concise, effective prose, and know how to identify, as well as correct, common mechanical and grammatical errors.

While this is a course that focuses on fiction, which is inherently intended to present readers with new, unusual, and sometimes challenging ideas, it is important to create a safe and welcoming environment for our class. The content warnings provided are intended to give readers agency in preparing for material that might negatively impact their mental state. I will be providing individual content warnings for texts as needed, but certain texts in the class contain discussions and depictions of death/dying, violence/gore, murder, political violence, child abuse/endangerment, psychological distress, intrusive thoughts/obsessive behaviour, eating disorders, paranoia, misogynistic attitudes, sexual harassment, ghosts/spirits, the afterlife, poverty, antiquated views of mental health, medical malpractice and abuse, and disregard for personal autonomy.

If the content discussed in these texts may upset you, please contact me to discuss, if you feel safe and comfortable doing so. If I have overlooked troubling content in a specific text's content warning, I apologize sincerely and assure you that I will try to do better in the future. Any clarification that you feel safe and comfortable offering is welcomed and appreciated.

All specific instructions and formatting requirements for assignments will be provided on their respective assignment sheets.

<u>Assignment submissions</u>: Please submit assignments to their assigned D2L drop-box by **11:59 pm** (PST) on their specified due dates.

Requests for formal extensions will be considered on an individual basis in discussion with the instructor.

<u>Due dates</u>: While we live in a particularly challenging time, and I aim to be flexible and understanding, due dates are there to help us move through class at a smooth, manageable pace. However, if an assignment is unavoidably late, it will receive a grade, but no comments. Late assignments will receive a grade, but no comments. If an assignment is more than a week late without a formal extension, it will lose 5% per day, including weekends, until it is submitted.

<u>Generative AI</u>: I would not recommend the use of generative AI programs as they write boring essays that tell me and you nothing about yourself and your thoughts. I would rather have an imperfect essay where I see you thinking, trying, and working things out than bland, smooth monotony. If you do use any generative AI, its work is not your work. As such, you must put its words in quotation marks to let me know they are not your words, and you must provide a proper citation. The Camosun Library has produced a guide to help you in citing such tools: <u>https://camosun.libguides.com/ai/citation</u>. However, you are not a tool, you are a human being. It is all we have, really. Thinking your own thoughts and struggling slightly to produce your own work is far more interesting and valuable.

Class Environment:

This course is an inclusive, non-judgmental, and respectful space: While it is an online course, our class is a shared environment wherein we are all learners and collaborators; it is a place where we have fun, learn, and express ourselves. New knowledge is gained when we learn collaboratively and feel connected. Respect for each other, and the many divergent views we will encounter in this course, is a requirement for all participants. Disagree with one another, but disrespectful language and actions are not tolerated. Please practice judgment, maturity, politeness, and respect in all interactions and communications with your fellow learners and with your instructor. Interpreting literature is a personal experience. If you find that any works or discussion comments troubling to you, please let me know, to the extent you feel safe and comfortable doing so, so that you can be well supported.

<u>Participation</u> will be essential to creating a good online classroom. Being comfortable sharing your views and learning from others can take time, but it will benefit your learning and communication skills. Be curious, record your observations, questions, and ideas as you read, reflect on what we read and discuss, ask questions, and develop your critical thinking skills.

<u>Communication outside class</u>: Check your email and D2L email regularly (and possibly consider linking these accounts, which can be done through D2L), to keep connected with this asynchronous class.
