- Produce writing under exam or exam-like conditions;
- Write clear, concise, effective prose, and know how to identify as well as correct common mechanical and grammatical errors.
- Evaluate secondary sources and integrate where applicable;
- Write persuasive arguments in scholarly, academic essay format, using MLA documentation.

Some Course Context

- The crossroads symbol is an archetype located in the individual and collective unconscious.
- As an object of contemplation, every crossroad symbol is both the same and different, individual and collective, depending on who is looking at it.
- This course will argue for the underlying presence of the crossroads symbol as the
 archetypal symbol of the human experience, of being and becoming, and will prove
 that popular culture (or what is popular in popular culture) tells the human story
 through the archetypal symbol of the crossroads.
- The texts in this course are intended as the means to facilitate the secret knowledge of the crossroads symbol.

- Encounters where different truths intersect and meet is one of the paths to secret knowledge.
- The central argument in the course description reads: "If alien anthropologists were tasked with returning to their home planet with the symbol of the human story, they would return with the symbol of the crossroads. Through an examination of this symbol in a variety of texts (most being examples from popular culture), this course will prove the crossroads as the symbol of symbols, the symbol of being and becoming."
