CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Students analyze works from a variety of genres and periods by women of various nationalities and ethnicities. Attention is paid to recurring themes, socio-historical context and feminist theories. Students participate in class discussions, compose critical essays and write a final exam. Assignments range from 500-1500 words (course total 3000-5000 words).

Upon successful completion of this course a student will be able to:

When reading works written by such important authors as Woolf, Chopin, Rich, Atwood, and A. Walker, as well as works by many lesser known authors, consider meaning, make and support inferences, and evaluate the works.

At the end of the course students will be able to:

- Evaluate works from a variety of genres (including poetry, short fiction, essay and novel) to determine the relevance of the conventions of that genre.
- Analyze works from different periods of history to determine the effect of social context on women's writing.
- Identify the various nationalities, ethnicities, socio-economic groups and sexual orientations from which women write in order to determine personal influences on a work.

When discussing literature, students will be develop and communicate responses and interpretations using a variety of critical methods and resources.

At the end of the course students will be able to:

- Identify the relevance of the authors' socio-historical context to their works.
- Discuss themes in order to determine and account for dominant or recurring ideas.
- Describe works according to the concepts provided by feminist theorists.
- Compare and contrast works and authors according to style, theme and use of literary devices.

When writing about literature, students will be expected to explain, support, and illustrate their interpretations of the works in essays and a final exam.

At the end of the course students will be able to:

- Support claims with relevant textual evidence.
- Document sources using current MLA conventions.

 - I will meet with you to discuss your work: in-person and online conversation about the course materials, assignments, and grading are welcome.
 - I welcome the participation of students with diverse learning needs. Please let me know how I can help support your learning.
- (b) What I expect from you: active participation and respectful engagement to foster a positive classroom climate through your:
 - Timely and consistent participation, both in class and online;
 - Thorough preparation: please complete readings in advance of each week's discussions, and come prepared to discuss the literary texts, with a copy of the work in hand so that you can participate;
 - Engagement in class activities, including participation in discussion, writing, editing, and peer review;
 - Willingness to be open to diverse opinions and views and to respond thoughtfully.

Academic integrity:

- Academic writers are expected to present original work and to be scrupulous in attributing credit for any ideas and quotations that are drawn from research sources. We will review Camosun's policies on academic integrity in class and we will review how to select, integrate, and cite your sources. You are always welcome to check with me if you have questions about how to ensure that you are using sources appropriately.
- We will also discuss the appropriate use of generative AI in academic writing; there are challenges with the ethics and accuracy of the current iteration, and while there are instances where it's a useful tool, your assignments must be **composed and edited entirely by you**; with the exception of the Writing Centre and the use of computer spelling/grammar checks (which can be faulty), outside assistance is not permitted.

Assignment submission and completion; late and missing assignments:

- Assignments are to be submitted online by midnight on the due date through our class D2L site. I will review with you how to upload your assignment and access your feedback file.
- The Learning Activities **must** be posted online by the due date: they are part of our class-wide learning process and timely posting is needed so that your class members can respond and engage with your ideas. In the event of illness or other extenuating circumstances, you may ask to submit your work directly to the instructor.
- Late **Major assignments** will be penalized at the rate of 5% per day and will not be accepted after one week unless there are serious extenuating circumstances, such as illness or emergency.
- All course work must be completed by the final day of the term in order to receive credit.
- To complete the course, you must submit all of the assignments worth more than 10%.
