CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Students investigate Canadian literature from the late nineteenth century to the present. Short stories, poetry, drama, essays, and novels are presented in many contexts, including historical and geographical. Critical essays and a final examination are required. Assignments total approximately 5000 words and range from 500 to 2500 words.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES / OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

- 1. When reading Canadian literature, students will be encouraged to make connections, evaluate works based on established critical criteria, and recognize both the general characteristics of Canadian literature as well as those of individual authors. At the end of the course students will be able to:
 - Analyze Canadian literature from the nineteenth century to the present, with emphasis on post 1950 works and the rich diversity of authors and works.
 - Evaluate a variety of genres, which may include poetry, short fiction, novels, drama, and essays, according to critical precepts appropriate to the specific genre.
 - Compare works such as those from E.J. Pratt, Earle Birney, Dorothy Livesey, P.K. Page, Al Purdy, Margaret Laurence, Margaret Atwood, Alice Munro, Timothy Findley, and Rohinton Mistry while applying concepts that demonstrate the development of Canadian literature. Note that individual instructors may put a slight change of focus in this course by choosing one author over another, but the general tenor of the course will remain the same.
- 2. When discussing Canadian literature, students will be encouraged to develop their own interpretations of the works using a variety of critical methods and resources. At the end of the course students will be able to:
 - Identify the socio-historical context of the works and relate the works to others as part of a literary continuum.
 - Identify and account for recurring themes in Canadian Literature.
 - Compare and contrast various works, authors, and styles within the context of the overall development of Canadian literature.
 - Distinguish between the subjective and objective aspects of works in order to formulate informed judgments about the works being discussed.
 - Identify the influence of dominant critical theories or movements in the contexts of the literature studied.
- 3. When writing about the literature, students will be expected to demonstrate their understanding of the above issues and to explain, support, and illustrate their interpretations of literature in essays and a final examination. At the end of the course students will be able to:
 - Support their work with relevant textual evidence.
 - Document sources using current MLA conventions.

• A note on first principles: In this class, we will debate and discuss many things as we explore the diverse, rich and powerful literatures of Canadian writers and artists. One thing not up for debate is the identity, self-determination and sovereignty of Indigenous people. That means that the multiple and deep harms of colonialism—the dispossession of land and self-determining authority by a dominant settler system of governance and culture—are also not up for debate. This is not meant to limit discussion; on the contrary, it will provide a starting point from which edifying, enriching and mutually instructive conversations can develop and flourish.

If you would like to discuss any of these issues, you are welcome to make an appointment with me and we can converse in my office—not in class.

- All readings must be completed **BEFORE the class assigned to them.** Bring the readings with you to class.
- Participation is worth a hefty 10%, so please bring your brilliant ideas and observations to class. Attending class, preparing well, and bringing an inquisitive, generous, and energetic spirit not only shows all of us you respect the learning environment, but it will also put you in a great position to succeed on the assignments.

You are encouraged to stay home if you feel ill. If you are unable to come to class, there are other ways to participate: through online discussion groups, my office hours, or over email.

- Start working right away. Life comes at you fast. And by life, I mean deadlines. Don't procrastinate, do the readings, and don't underestimate how long an assignment will take. If you get a disappointing grade on an early assignment, make adjustments don't assume the same level of work will get you a better mark later.
- Deadlines: Deadlines are organized to facilitate marking and returning papers in a timely manner, and to give you the greatest benefit from feedback for future assignments. They also establish that I am a human, with a life, and give me some surety around which I may organize this life.
- In-class writing assignments and quizzes cannot be made up. Major assignments submitted late will be docked a 5% per day penalty. However, you have a one-time amnesty for one of the three essay assignments. This is to recognize that you, too, are humans with lives, and that sometimes those get in the way of coursework. I want to give you the best chance to succeed in the course, but please respect the above. You must let me know in advance of the deadline that an assignment will be late.

Late work may not be handed back in a timely manner and may not receive extensive feedback.

Any student who faces challenges securing their food or housing and believes this may affect their

• A note on Artificial Intelligence: This second-year literature class is meant to strengthen and develop critical reading, thinking and writing. These skills are **recursive**; that is, they influence and inform each other as we move from one to the next: writing your thoughts changes what you think, which subsequently changes how you read, and so on. For these reasons, Al-writing tools like Chat GPT, JasperAl, Quillbot, etc. are strictly prohibited. This includes not only generating writing at any level (final drafts, paragraphs, sentences), but also generating ideas, outlines, or revisions. The use of such tools constitute plagiarism and violate Camosun's Academic Integrity policy.
