CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course provides core critical thinking, reading, research and writing skills transferable to academic disciplines. Students practice various forms of academic writing, including summary, critical analysis, and written research. Analysis of textual rhetoric, discourse, and style, along with academic essay-writing, develops self-awareness of methods of inquiry, critique, and reflection.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES / OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

1. Form critical responses to ideas.

- Distinguish between fact and opinion.
- Analyse and articulate the reasoning behind an argument.
- Demonstrate a critical examination of ideas through close reading, inquiry, divergent thinking, evaluation of evidence and interpretation, as well as an understanding of rhetoric, reason, logic and word usage.
- Produce writing under exam conditions, as well as outside class.
- Differentiate academic and non-academic writing.

2. Write in an academic style common to multiple disciplines.

- Approach writing as an active exploration of multiple perspectives on a topic.
- Compose effective summaries.
- Select and use rhetorical patterns purposefully.
- Employ a comprehensive writing process, which includes prewriting, focusing, planning, multiple drafting, conferring, revising and editing/proofing.
- Develop an argument with a controlling thesis; write unified, coherent paragraphs, including effective introductions, transitions and conclusions in correct, clear, effective English.
- Develop effective, focused research questions.
- Demonstrate control, clarity and cohesion in the development and organization of ideas.
- Vary style purposefully for planned rhetorical strategies.
- Write for specific results.
- Critique his/her own and others' writing.

3. Read and analyze complex texts from various academic disciplines.

- Vary reading approaches for different purposes, such as personal response, persuasion, and criticism.
- Participate and engage in a dynamic, stimulating exchange of ideas based upon close textual readings.
- Discuss and debate text using terminology appropriate to the discipline and context of those texts.
- Analyze textual readings, which may include visual texts, by identifying controlling ideas, supporting details, dominant rhetorical pattern, subtext, tone and stylistic features.
- Summarize readings to reflect coherently the original's ideas, purpose, organization, and tone.
- Critically read your own and others' writing.

4. Demonstrate information literacy skills.

- Determine the nature and extent of the information needed.
- Know and use what information resources are available, in different formats.
- Use print and electronic resources effectively and efficiently.
- Evaluate sources for authority, relevance, reliability, currency and other criteria.
- Incorporate and integrate research through correct use of summary, paraphrase and quotation.
- Document sources fully and ethically, according to specified bibliographic conventions.

5. Develop self-awareness as an academic writer and contributor.

- Articulate one's position in a critical debate of ideas.
- Reflect on one's own writing for continuous improvement.

This course is offered in-person and supplemented using the D2L course site, which means that for the most part (Covid restrictions permitting), you will learn in class through lectures, discussions, activities, reflections and small-group work. For this reason, attendance in class is required; online materials are supplementary. Core class content will be delivered in class (unless we are required to switch to online learning). Prep for and explanation of assignments will be done in class, *so be sure to attend!* I am available for consultation, and to support your learning by expanding on topics, clarifying assignments, discussing selected texts, and answering your questions. Here is the rhythm of our week:

1. See D2L for selected materials that we have covered in class each week; complete any assigned readings before class. Be aware that for in-person delivery, D2L material cannot duplicate class instruction.
2. In class, I will use videos, PowerPoints/lectures, activities and other links/materials to teach academic writing essentials.
3. In-class activities & discussions will provide more context & insight into essay structure, terminology, readings and interpretations.
4. Occasionally, I will post short videos on D2L that provide a follow-up from class and/or delve into writing practices that you will need for your assignments.
5. Doing the readings, studying materials, and applying feedback on your written assignments will increase your grade and deeply enrich your learning.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

This course is a safe, inclusive, non-judgmental and respectful space. Through readings and discussions, we will be exposed to and sharing a wide variety of perspectives and experiences. Be sensitive to others and their responses. If you find that any works or discussion comments trigger you, please let me know so that you can be well supported.

This course involves intensive writing, reading, deep thinking, and self-reflection. This course develops your skill in a particular style of writing called the *academic style*. This style calls for attention to structure, content and development of ideas and details. Academic writing offers divergent and critical ways of reading, writing, thinking, and ways of being that shape your responses.

Participation allows us to consider different views that enrich our own understanding. Learning how to share your own views and to experience learning through others benefits your communication and interpretive skills. Become curious and always ask questions to develop your critical thinking skills. No judgments!

Complete all assignments by the deadlines. Deadlines are put in place to help you move through the class smoothly and at a regular pace. However, it is true that “life happens.” Therefore, one late assignment will be accepted, but tell me that it will be late. Plus, it must be submitted before the last class. Late assignments will not receive commentary. If you have trouble submitting *any* assignments on time, please contact me.

Assignments follow the formatting guidelines in the course pack. All assignments must be typed, paginated, and double-spaced. *There are no re-writes.* There are no make-ups for the in-class writing, unless you submit documentation verifying an emergency and the fact that you could not attend class that day.

Check our D2L course site and your email regularly. All course materials, news announcements, and reminders will be uploaded or sent that way. If you cannot access the D2L course site during the first week, **please let me know.** Redirect your D2L email if you would prefer to receive your email through a different email address (such as “gmail”).

At the time of publication, this class is exclusively face-to-face delivery. Attendance is required for each and every class for the full class period. If you miss classes regularly, you will jeopardize your ability to pass this course. Your probability of passing the course without attending or attending rarely is extremely slim (*see below*). If you miss a class, it is your responsibility to get and learn the material that you missed.
